SCIENTIFIC MISCELLANY.

Travelers have noted that Damascus blades are made only when the wind is from the north. The experiments of M. Anozoff were suggested by this hint, and have consisted in hardening steel instruments by cooling them in a powerful current of compressed air in-stead of quenching in water. The trials indicate that for very sharp tools this method is superior to any other. The effect varies with the thickness of the mass to be hardened, and increases with the coldness of the air and the rapidity of the stream.

A curious kinematograph illusion is the turning backward of carriage wheels. An explanation is that be-tween the instantaneous views making up the moving picture the wheels moved not quite the space between the spokes, so that other spokes, all being alike—are seen just behind the place first occupied.

A novel charge is brought against the common bedbug (Cimex lectular-ius) by Dr. W. J. Goodhue, medical superintendent of the Malokai leper settlement, who regards it as a chief agent in spreading leprosy. It is be-lieved to have greater influence than lieved to have greater influence than the gnat, for it comes noiselessly and during the patient's sleep, and bedding among lepers is too little disinfected. After long research, Dr. Goodhue has demonstrated the presence of the bacillus of leprosy in the mosquito (Culex pongens) as well as in the bedbug. bedbug.

The chemical synthesis of our foods must remain a dream for the present, we are told by Prof. T. Bokorny, a German chemist. With the aid of sunlight, plants form carbohydrates from carbonic acid or formaldehyde or me-thyl alcohol, and in like manner sugthyl alcohol, and in like manner sugars or corbohydrates have been produced in the laboratory by agitating formaldehyde with excess of hydrate of lime. The artificial process, however, cannot yield cane sugar to retail at five or six cents a pound, while Emil Fischer's albumenoids cost many lines. times as much as the natural product

A new modification of oxygen seems to have been discovered by Dr. Erick Ladenburg. From the purest of oxygen, developed by electrolysis of boiled potassium hydrate, he prepares liquid ozone, and this he allows to vaporize into a vacuum, obtaining nearly pure ozone gas, which has a deep blue color in a thickness of eight inches, The absorption spectrum shows five new lines that do not belong to ozone. They always appear when the liquid ozone is allowed to vaporize, and the gas to which they belong can be separated. The molecular weight is higher than that of ozone.
