TO BE STRONG FOR PROTECTION

But Party Will Not be Bound to No Revision, Nor Committed to Any Schedule.

Washington, May 3 .- The platform to be adopted by the Republican national convention has been among the topics discussed at the conferences which have taken place recently at the White House, in committee rooms at the Capnol and at different residences where a number of Republicans have been assembled. Senator Lodge, who is slated for chairman of the committee on resolutions at the convention, has prepared preliminary sketches of various topics that he thinks should be treated and has submitted them to senators and others for their approval or suggestion as to the amendment. It is expected that before the convention meets a complete platform will be prepared that will have the approval of the which

president. The principal feature of the platform will be the tariff plank, which will dethe strongest terms the ad herence of the Republican party to the principle of protection, but will not principle of protection, but will not bind the party not to revise the tariff, it will say that the party is not com-mitted to any schedule, but that changes should be made only when changed conditions of business or the treasury render it necessary or advis-able. Persons present at the recent conferences say it already has been agreed that the tariff will be revised in agreed that the tariff will be revised in the Fifty-ninth Congress if the Repub-licans win in November. There is at present a determination to make the platform as brief as possible, conse-quently the endorsement of the admin-istration and the acts of the party will be put in compact form. This endorsement will be a general approval of the president and the Repub-licans.

## New York City Bonds.

New York, May 3.-Bfds were opened today by Comptroller Grout for \$37,-000,000 of city bonds at 3½ per cent, \$10,000,000 for 10 years and the balance for 50 years. The issue was oversub-scribed about seven times. The comp-troller said that W. J. Seligman & Co. and Edward Sweet & Co. probably will get the \$10,000,600, having made 10 sin-gle bids aggregating that amount at gle bids aggregating that amount at rates ranging from 100.88 to \$101.53. Kidder, Peabody & Co.; Baring, Magoun & Co., end Fiske & Robinson, who bid jointly \$100.7013 for all or any part of the bonds will probably get about \$25,000, 000. Comptroller Grout said that the bids were so numerous that he would not have to accept any of the "all or none" bids.

The defendants were members of the Telluride Citizens' al-liance and others who participated in the forcible deportation of 60 to 75 strikers from that city on the night of March 14 last. Among those who will be named as defendants is Cant. Bulkebe named as defendants is Capt. Bulke-ley Wells of Troop A, Colorado na-tional guard. The men who participat-ed in the deportation of the unionists were especially enjoined by Judge were especially enjoined by Judge Stevens from interfering with the re-turn of the eviles.

Vancouver, B. C., May 3.-W. F. King, Canadian boundary commission-er, is en route to Vancouver to arrange for the dispatch of three Canadian par-ties of surveyors who are to work Company's Terms Accepted and San Francisco, May 4.—The threat-ened strike on the United railroad's lines in this city, has been averted by the acceptance early this morning by the carmen's union of the terms of the company submitted through Mayor Schmitz. This action followed some weeks of negotiations between the company and the union. #### Speaker Cannon Wouldn't Have It Under Any Circumstances.

Washington, May 3.-"Even at the risk of being accused of declining that which I probably could not get if I desired it, I answer most unequivocally that if the nomination were tendered to me I would not accept it under any circumstances whatever.

Thus strongly said Speaker Cannon, in an authorized interview with a Post reporter today to emphasize his deter-mination with reference to the vice presidency. As he concluded dictating

"What are your reasons for such a statement?" he was asked. "I have been for almost 20 years a member of the national house of repre-sentatives. I may say my life work has been in connection with legislation in the house. I have been nominated by the Republicans of the congressional district in which I reside and accepted the nomination. I have every reason to hope I shall be re-elected. "One word more. There are many men in the Republican party in the middle west and elsewhere who are better equipped for the office of vice president than I am and who would add more strength to the ticket than I would, so that the decision as above

Forty Indictments Are Returned Against Twenty-Six Persons.

Denver, Colo., May 3.—The grand jury returned 40 indictments against 26 persons, alleging election frauds, today. Among the persons named in the indictments and the charges against them are Julius Aichele, county clerk, receiving padded registration rolls; Walter B. Lowry, supervisor, padded registration; Charles W. Cochran, alregistration: Charles W. Cochran, al-derman, padding registration: John D. Ross, alderman, padding registration, Gus Kappan and John Hendricks, dep-uty constables; W. A. Dollison, candi-date for alderman on the Republican ticket: John Hail, a ward worker, and William Alton, now deceased, but form-erly a ward worker, are indicted for alleged fraudulent work at the election of 1902. The latter indictment was re-turned to prevent the statute of limi-tations running against them. Aichele turned to prevent the statute of limi-tations running against them. Aichele is a Democrat, and Lowry, Ross and Cochran are Republicans. The latter is secretary of the Republican state central committee and is a candidate for re-election on the Republican alder-manic ticket.
