A Peculiar Weapon. - Brother James Dunn has presented to the Museum a peculiar looking weapon, a kind of pike, with a hatchet face and a long semi-circular blade projecting from behind it. This, with a long pole stuck in it, constituted the weapon of defense and attack of the late Brother Benbow, when he was in the Nauvoo Legion, when it was commanded by General Joseph Smith, in troublous times, when the saints were beset by blood thirsty mobs. Fire arms were scarce in those days, and people had to defend their homes and families with the handiest weapons they could get.
