WASHINGTON, 6.—The following clause the Committee of Ways and Means has inserted in the new tariff bill, that in lieu of the duties now imposed, there shall be levied and collected on printing paper used for books, magazines, and newspapers exclusively, of a size not less than 12 by 16 inches, 20 per cent. ad valorem; on drawing, foolecap, imperial, letter and note paper, 35 per cent. ad valorem; provided that all papers printed under this act, cut into foolscap, moquum, cap and letter paper sizes, to be issued for any purpose whatsoever, except printing, shall be forfeited to the government, and the provisions of this section be and are hereby repealed.

The present tariff on paper less than 32 by 46 inches stands unaffected by this amendment.
