

MORE SENTENCES.

Prisoners Who Were Dealt With by Judge Barthel This Morning.

A "HOUSEBREAKER'S" ELONGUENCE

Sentence of Cases for Trial—Naturalization—One by Chief Justice Barrett—A Divorce Granted.

Judge Barthel sentenced another case of party of offenders against the law in his division of the Third district court this morning, some arrangements were made, and then the court proceeded with further trial of cases on the present list of sentences.

SIX MONTHS FOR A MURDER.

H. Smith alias Frank Willard, the festive housebreaker who was convicted yesterday afternoon, appeared for sentence. He pleaded not guilty. In the Criminal Court, Barthel, and told the court that he had never in his life before committed a crime of any kind. He had been in prison three months awaiting trial. Judge Barthel sentenced him to six months' imprisonment in the penitentiary, his previous good character being taken into consideration.

EIGHT MONTHS FOR A MURDER.

J. M. Williams, convicted yesterday of attempting to pass a fictitious check, stood today for punishment. He, too, appeared to have had a very fair trial up to the time of committing this offense. He was sentenced to eight months in the penitentiary.

A HOUSEBREAKER.

Lawrence Cunningham, who had previously pleaded guilty to housebreaking, also came up for sentence. Attorney W. T. Gannett, who had been appointed by the court to represent him, asked for a fine of \$100. Cunningham was sentenced to six months in the penitentiary.

In reply to the court, Assistant District Attorney Richards said the defendant was a man who had been in prison for a long time, and who had been in the habit of passing a fictitious check. He was sentenced to six months in the penitentiary.
