"That's the way the money goes." We fear Salt Lake City is going to be rather overdone this summer by the itinerant show fraternity, when we remember how little money there is in the country. By the way, while referring to circuses, who is that has willfully torn the beautiful show pictures of Castello's Menagerie opposite the Theatre? Some folks never seem happy except when they are in mischief. How much easier it is to destroy than create.

HARTZ THE ILLUSIONIST.—Last night there was a very slim house at the Theatre, which was really to be regretted when the excellence of the performance is considered. Mr. Hartz is certainly well deserving of the title of "King of the Illusionists."

We have had the pleasure of witnessing Anderson, "Wizard of the North" as he is generally called, besides Robert Heller and other professors of the prestidigitant art but the performance of Mr. Hartz is certainly far ahead of any of them. The beholder cannot help being struck with wonder and delight at the amazing dexterity manifested by this emperor of the prestidigitants.

Many of his tricks are original with him, and where this is not the case his method of performing them is so superior to the old method that there is scarcely any comparison between them. It is well for Mr. Hartz that he lives at a time when science and natural philosophy are so advanced as they are at the present day; had he lived two or three hundred years ago he would have been very likely to have suffered for practicing diabolism. He has no gorgeous display of paraphernalia to attract the eye of the beholders, and the whole performance is done so openly and above board that the audience is completely bewildered.

This performance should draw largely. All who wish to see an exhibition in which there is such a display of natural philosophy and skill should certainly make it a point to go and see Mr. Hartz. To-night there will be a complete change in the programme.

WEBER CITY.—Thomas Colburn Esq., of Weber City called in to see us yesterday. He says the crops in that section are doing most excellently, cheering the hearts of the farmers, who for the most part have lost their crops during the last two years owing to the ravages of the grasshoppers.

Mr. C. further reports the health of the people in Weber City to be very good. The Female Relief Society there is flourishing, and the people are now entering into co-operation, it being expected their store will be opened in a very short time.

EDUCATIONAL CONVENTION.—A convention of School Superintendents and teachers will be held at Trenton, New Jersey, in the third week in August, which Superintendents and Teachers from every School District in the Union are expected to attend. A series of lectures will be delivered by eminent professors and others on the best method of imparting instruction, and upon other matters pertaining to the school system of the country, a system which has placed the United States in the front rank among the nations in these matters. R. L. Campbell Esq., of this city, Superintendent of Common Schools for the Territory has received an invitation to attend, but it is to be regretted that the long distance and his many duties here will prevent his participation in this very important gathering of those immediately connected with and so highly interested in the advancement of education throughout the country.

DIXIE.—We had the pleasure of meeting, this morning, Elder Joseph W. Young, who reached the city last evening, after a trip of eight days from St. George. He reports that the crops look well all through the Territory from this city to Beaver. At Parowan and Cedar Breaks the grasshoppers have done a vast amount of damage. Kanarrab has also suffered to some extent from their incursions. All was well in the far south when he left. On the Muddy the grain was harvested, and they had not been troubled with the ironclads. Should they visit the southern section, he thinks the cotton crop would be too far advanced for them to do it any material injury.
