Deceased was born at Gray Abbey, County Down, Ireland, April 6, 1828; was baptized April 15, 1846; was ordained an Elder May 15, 1864, and emigrated to Utah from Scotland the same year. He labored faithfully and set an example worthy of imitation as a High Priest and acting Teacher in the ward and the Sunday School.

At St. George, June 28th, 1880, ANNE PATTERSON McINTIRE. Deceased was daughter of Wm. Patterson and Margaret Lynn Patterson, and born December 19th, 1811, in Indian's County, Pa. She was baptized November 23rd, 1836; gathered with the Saints to Nauvoo in 1840. Went with the Saints to Council Bluffs and from thence traveled to Salt Lake Valley in 1849. Resided in Salt Lake City till the autumn of 1861, when her husband was called on a mission to aid in settling in the vicinity of the junction of the Rio Virgin and Santa Clara, where she has since resided.

After an unpretentious, but unceasingly consistent life as a Latter-day Saint for 44 years, she has passed away in the full faith of the Gospel of Christ. [COM.]

OBITUARY.

Died at Newton, Cache County, Utah Territory, April 9th, 1880, of paralysis, FOSTER CURTIS, aged 53 years, 11 months and 1 day. He leaves a wife and three children.

He was born May 8th, 1826, in Oakland County, Michigan, and was baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Caldwell County, Missouri, September, 1857. He was a Seventy; worked as a stone cutter and dresser on the Nauvoo Temple. During the persecutions of the Saints in Illinois and Missouri he was with them and he bore without a complaint all the trials that fell to his lot. He left the scenes of his childhood with the Saints when they were driven into the wilderness, and was enrolled as one of the Mormon Battalion. While with them he was familiarly called Bob Curtis. He came to Utah at an early day and resided in Salt Lake City until about nine years ago, when he removed to Newton, where he lived from that time until his death. For a period of seven years he belonged to the body guard of the Prophet Brigham, and previous to leaving Salt Lake, was a special policeman there. He worked on the Salt Lake Temple for some time. He was a member and officer in the Newton United Order, in which he took an active part. He was a man of the purest principles and greatest integrity, and was well respected by all who knew him, wherever he went he gained the good will of all his associates. He was liberal to the poor, faithful and true to his trust as a servant of God, and as a good useful member of the ward in which he lived. He has passed from earth with a full assurance of an eternal salvation with the redeemer and sanctified in Jesus Christ. [COM.]

IN MEMORIAM.

Brother Levi Murdock, who died at West Weber, Weber County, Utah, on the 18th of September, 1879, was born in the State of Vermont on the 18th of May, 1794.

Brother Luman Shurtliff gives the following brief account of his adoption of the Latter-day belief and his journeying to these valleys:

At the close of a meeting held in Warren County, Ind., August 13th, 1840, Levi Murdock came to be, and taking me by the hand asked me if this was Mormon doctrine. I replied that it was. He said, I believe every word of it; it is the true faith. From this time his house was open for meetings and also for the accommodation of Saints. On the 28th of August, 1840, I baptized and confirmed him a Latter-day Saint.

Early in the spring of 1841, Brother Murdock gathered a small company of Saints and started west with his family. At Nauvoo he stopped for me to go with him, and with his assistance I was enabled to cross the Mississippi River with my family.

The 6th of June we arrived at Garden City, went immediately to putting in a crop, with the understanding that if any of the company left before the crop matured, that those that remained should have the benefit of it. Bro. Murdock and a few others left, leaving the crop for us. When I arrived in Utah, I found him here, the same good friend and Saint, which he continued to be until his death.—COM.
