egden. June 18.-By a vote of 5 to 2 in the city council last night the ordinance granting a franchise to W. J. Stephens for the installation of an in dependent waterworks system was defeated to the great surprise of those who were not on the inside. The meeting was held for the special purpose of passing the ordinance to its third reading. From expressions made by reading. From expressions made by members at recent sessions of the city council it was supposed that no trouble would be met with in securing the franchise. When the final vote was taken, however, a silence like the calm before the storm prevailed throughout the council chamber, as President Browning announced that the ordinance had been killed.

Atty. A. G. Horn, representing the Stephens Investment company, was sumfounded. He stated afterwards that he had been given every reason to believe that the application for a franchise would be favorably considered by the city council.

As councilmen Powers, Thomas and Dickson were absent from last nights session and as it requires a majority of councilmen elected to pass an ordinance, the votes of Councilmen Peery and Humphris in opposition to the ordinance were sufficient to defeat it. Those who voted in favor of the ordinance were Browning, Wilson, Flygare, Dana and Austin.

For several days workmen have been putting in shape the east end of the tabernacle to suit the placing of the organ. The design of the organ will be unique and beautiful. The entire east end of the tabernacle will be filled, the pipes occupying the center and projecting squares in each corner. Thus three sides of a rectangle will be formed in which the choir will have its seats while the player will be seated at the right toward the front. Logan will thus have a mammoth, imposing organ, the finest in the west, as regards strength and beauty of tone, quality, not even excepting the kimball organ in the Salt Lake tabernacle. This organ was built by Henry Pilcher & Sons of Louisville, Ky, Workmen came with the organ and in about five weeks it is expected that the instrument will be ready for use.
