LOCAL BRIEFS.

Travelers from the north report heavy snow at Idaho Falls.

The Federation of Labor will give a Thanksgiving ball tonight, in its hall.

Smelter officials report that Garfield is destined to become a city of 10,000 in the not distant future.

Implement dealers report this month's sales as decidedly greater than those of November, last year.

The state board of loan commissioners has purchased \$25,000 worth of Salt Lake City school bonds at \$1.04 1/2.

D company, First Infantry, proposes to actually hold a drill tomorrow night, the first since the state encampment.

The Salt Lake stock yards are having a lively time of it this week in making large shipments of cattle and stockers, and branding.

One of the inmates of 24 Commercial street was taken with smallpox yesterday afternoon and the house was closed under quarantine.

The Southwest mission of the First Presbyterian church will give a "Deseret School" next Friday night, in aid of the local work.

The directors' room at the Deseret National bank is being removed to the rear of the main banking room, so as to give more space to the offices up in front.

The interior of the First Presbyterian church is rapidly assuming a finished appearance, as the fitting and the placing of the hardwood finish are being completed.

The American Falls Canal & Irrigation company has disposed of stock to C. Campbell of Idaho Falls and to J. H. Schreck of Pocatello, who have also become directors.

Miss Augusta L. Hunt, a teacher in the Riverside school, was married last evening to Wilbur Rowland of this city, by Rev. Earl Young of the First Methodist church.

The Methodist church is preparing to erect a new Diocesan home on Fourth East between Third and Fourth South, at a cost of \$11,000. O. M. Engdahl has the contract.

Secy. M. D. Wells of the Consolidated Wagon & Machine company is at the Palmer House in Chicago, closing settlements for the past year, and making contracts for 1906.

The resident members of the Y. M. C. A. will give a Thanksgiving banquet at the association building, this evening, when provision will be made for 50 guests. It will be a "stap" affair.

Gov. Cutler, the justices of the supreme court and other state officers will go to Ogden tomorrow to inspect the state industrial school and the state school for the deaf, dumb and blind.

The waiters of the Knutsford and Wilson hotels and the Emery-Holmes apartments will hold a Thanksgiving ball this evening in Harmonie hall. This is an annual affair, and is always largely attended.

The non-commissioned officers' amusement club will give a sociable hop at the new armory on Pierpont street, this evening in place of their regular Saturday night ball. An enjoyable time is promised.

Joseph Rasmussen, the young man charged with indecent conduct with a young girl named Elsie Riley, pleaded guilty in Judge C. B. Diehl's court yesterday and was sentenced to the county jail for a period of six months.

Health Inspector Woodard found 20 cases of diphtheria at Fountain Green, and before he left had them all properly quarantined, and saw that the proper precautionary measures were taken against any further spread of the disease.

Forty resident members of the Y. M. C. A. indulged in a banquet last evening at the association hall, with P. C. Evans as toastmaster. Toasts were responded to by J. O. Hanson, William Blum, H. W. Wiley, J. P. Meakin, and others. The occasion was much enjoyed.

George Arbogast, the well known mining man, is up from Pioche and reports the business outlook down there as all that could be desired. He says the Pioche people are sure of having a branch road in there from Caliente, no distant day, particularly as so much of the grade is already built.

INSPECTION OF TREES. Mr. Sorenson's Report Shows Good Work Done During November.

The report of County Horticultural Inspector Sorenson for the month of November has been filed with the county commissioners. It shows that 100,000 trees have been inspected during the month and 20,000 were fumigated. Of the total number 3,000 trees were condemned. One of the inspector's deputies south of Murray inspected 15,000 trees and condemned 500. Twenty shipments of trees into the county were reported and inspected. One company failed to report its shipment and it will probably be prosecuted.
