Ohio Society to Entertain—The Ohio society will entertain the Ohio Men's chorus next Monday evening, Sept. 6, and on Sept. 20 they are to entertain the Governor of Ohio and staff, en route to the Seattle fair.

Delayed Steel Arrives—The long delayed steel for the Fisher building on West Temple street has arrived, so that the wagon carrying the steel and the building can now be reopened shortly, after having been closed for a number of weeks.

Wanted in Montana—Homer Cole, about 25 years of age, was taken into custody Saturday night by Deputy Corliss and Souder, on information received from the authorities at Butte, Cole is said to be wanted in Montana for robbery, and officers will arrive tonight to take him back for trial.

Hay Destroyed—Stacks of hay, amounting to \$1,500 in value, were destroyed by fire at the Dair farm, owned by M. E. Fitzgerald, Saturday evening. When the fire was discovered an alarm was sent in to which the apparatus from station No. 5 responded, and succeeded in saving the buildings adjoining the burning hay stacks.

Sheep Doing Well—Secretary Stewart of the Utah Wool Growers' association has returned from Utah county where he reports the ranges in fine condition owing to the frequent showers that have fallen during the summer, so that all kinds of stock are doing well, especially the sheep. There promises to be a big shipment of lambs out of that section this fall.

Republicans to Open Campaign—The Republicans will open their city campaign Friday evening, when a meeting of the city committee will be held. The place of the meeting has not been decided upon. Arrangements will be made at this time for the convention for the nomination of candidates. The precincts are organized and the district organizations will be taken up next.

BEER MUST BE SOLD OVER BAR

Otherwise Disposing of Liquid on Sunday Does Not Jeopardize License.

SO DECLARES H. J. DININNY.

City Attorney Appears in Brightness

In Police Court to Campaign For "American" Party.

Although Gus Veros was found guilty by a jury Saturday of having violated the liquor ordinance by selling beer on a Sunday, this fact will not jeopardize his saloon license, and at the council meeting tonight the charges recently brought against Veros looking to the revocation of his license will be dropped if the advice of City Atty. Dininny is taken. Such a statement was made to the jury trying Veros in Judge Bowman's court Saturday by City Atty. Dininny, who presented the unusual spectacle of the city attorney himself prosecuting a case in the police court.

DOES SOME CAMPAIGNING.

In his argument to the jury, City Atty. Dininny took occasion to explain his presence in the court and also to do a little campaigning for the "American" party. His statements reflected the greatest ambition of bridging the "American" party into the reform movement to punish the defendant for a violation of the law.

"The present administration," Mr. Dininny said, addressing the four men in the jury box, "wants to see all the saloons closed on Sunday, and if you will help us obtain a conviction in this case we will go after others."

Although the city had only two witnesses, both patrolmen, to prove its case against Veros, and has had no information of these witnesses since July 18, it was only at the trial Saturday that Mr. Dininny, according to his statement, was fully aware of the nature of the testimony and became satisfied that Veros' license was not in jeopardy.

MUST BE SOLD OVER BAR.

"The reason for my presence in this case," he said to the jury, "is this: The reason for the revocation of the Veros' license will come up before the city council Monday night and I want to be fully informed. It was our understanding that the beer had been sold over the bar, and if that had been the case, his license would have been revoked. However, it has been proven that the beer was sold in bottles in a room in the hotel upstairs, so even if he violated the law that would not affect the license of the saloon, and if the council takes my advice Monday night the matter will be dropped. I will advise them to drop the charges."

The verdict of the jury finding Veros guilty of having sold beer on Sunday, was something of a surprise to those who had been expecting a conviction. There was a considerable discrepancy between the evidence of the two officers, and particularly as regarded the identification of the several Greeks introduced into the case.

THIS MAN ADMITS IT.

A peculiar complication in the case was the testimony of John Demaris, lessee of the Albany hotel, who as a witness swore that it had been he who had sold the beer to the officers, admitting that he did so without even a license. The patrolmen admitted that he had served them beer once but they did not arrest him. It is probable that a complaint will now be filed against Demaris.

HEARING SEPT. 22.

Interstate Commerce Commission to Take Up Salt Lake Case.

Traffic Manager Babcock of the Commercial club is in receipt of intelligence stating that the Interstate commerce commission will begin its Salt Lake sittings in the U. S. circuit court room, Sept. 22. The carriers complained of by the Commercial club traffic bureau on the 11th of the railroads entering this city, and 10 other connecting lines. Judge Day will represent the Utah shippers, while the railroads are to have all their legal heavy artillery present.

GIRLS AGAIN IN LEAD.

The girls were again in the lead in the reports to the board of health of births last week. There were 23 of them with 17 boys, 40 in all. There were 19 deaths reported, nine males and 10 females, and five bodies were shipped here for burial.

Contagious and infectious disease is more nearly normal, only eight new cases appearing on the books. But two of these were smallpox, four scarlet fever, and two of typhoid fever. There are seven houses under quarantine for smallpox, 11 for scarlet fever and one because of diphtheria. The isolation hospital is again closed.
