The girls were again in the lead in the reports to the board of health of births last week. There were 23 of them with 17 boys, 40 in all. There were 19 deaths reported, nine males and 10 females, and five bodies were shipped here for burial. Contagious and infectious disease is more nearly normal, only eight new cases appearing on the books. But two of these were smallpox, four scarlet fever, and two of typhoid fever. There are seven houses under quarantine for smalpox, 11 for scarlet fever and one because of diphtheria. The isolation hospital is again closed.
