#### **General Superintendent Welby Sends** Communication to Council,

**Special** Correspondence

Provo, Utah, March 4 .-- A communica tion from Superintendent Welby of the Rio Grande Western railway company was received at the meeting of the City council last evening, asking for a fran chise to build a depot on the west side of Academy avenue, opposite its pres-ent depot and projecting 27 feet on Academy avenue, on the plece of land which the company formerly had enclosed as a park, and which the city in a suit compelled the company to throw open for street purposes. The com-munication states that the company is desirous of providing a depot in the city, suitable in size and convenience to the demands on the company at this point. The communication was referpoint. red to the committee on streets and al-leys. Agent Craig of the Short Line company was present for the purpose of stating the position of his company on the proposed depot in case the ques-tion had been considered by the council, as it was not he will present the views of his company to the committee. The Oregon Short Line company will object to the privilege of building an independent depot being granted to the R. G. W. company on the grounds that it will obstruct travel to and from the Oregon Short Line depot in Its present location. He will also bring be-fore the committee the proposal of his company to join the Rio Grande Western company in a union depot, in which case there would be no objection from the Oregon Short Line to having the depot built when the Rio Grande Western company asks to have it built.
