INDIANS IN SUNDAY SCHOOL.

Interesting Conference—Lamanites Receive the Priesthood

Koosharem, Steyer Co., June 25.—A State Sunday school district conference was held in the Koosharem ward today, and a very interesting time was had. Apostle A. O. Woodruff, Stake President William H. Seemiller, Elder L. John Nuttall, of the Sunday School board, and D. P. Felt, of the Juvenile Instructor, were present and gave timely instructions. A pleasing feature of the session was the attendance of about twenty-five intelligent Indians, who, it is said, take an active part in Sunday school work. The Lamanite class is taught by Elder George A. Hatch, who can talk in their language. He is assisted by Walker, a nephew of the late old chief Walker. This man is about 40 years of age, quite intelligent and talks English fluently; he is an ardent member of the Church, anxious to do all he can to explain the doctrines of the Church.

The Lamanite class was called on for an exercise and an Indian boy about 16 years of age, who is a very intelligent and capable young man, was called on to assist him but he also was too backward to do so. He finally made an attempt to come forward and do his part. The Indian boy's persistence was so marked that Apostle Woodruff paid special attention to it in his address and later at his suggestion the boy was ordained to the Aaronic Priesthood in the Lamanite quorum.

At noon, between the meetings, Apostle Woodruff invited all the Indians to meet at the residence of Elder Hatch for a social gathering. It was almost pitiable to see the struggle between duty and bashfulness. He begged a white boy to assist him but he also was too backward to do so. He finally made an attempt to come forward and do his part. The Indian boy's persistence was so marked that Apostle Woodruff paid special attention to it in his address and later at his suggestion the boy was ordained to the Aaronic Priesthood in the Lamanite quorum.

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
