The Times' despatch from Pesth, describing the funeral of M. Deak, says the route over which the procession passed was three and a half miles long and densely crowded from one end to the other with spectators. Every town and coun ty in Hungary sent deputations. Both houses of the Austrian Reichsrath sent delegation; members of legations and members of the Hungarian Diet were pallbearers. The Primate of Hungary performed the service. Count Andrassy was present. The floral decorations were most elaborate; it was necessary to provide a special carriage to carry by the people. The coffin was deposited close to Batthyani's monument.

LIVERPOOL, 4.—The steamship Palestine, from Boston, Jan. 19th, has arrived, and reports that she experienced a fearful hurricane in longitude 30 west, and lost her main mast. Her decks were swept, her third and fourth officers disabled, and several of her crew injured.

LONDON, 4.—Rev. Alexander H. Mackonochie, Curate of the noted "High Church," St. Albans, Brooke Street, Holborn, sends to the newspapers, to-day, a document signed by about 100 prominent ritualist cleigymen, fairly representative men, including most if not all who have been subjected to ecclesiastical prosecutions, disclaiming connection or sympathy with any movement looking to the subordination of the Anglican ritualists to the Papacy, declaring a basis for such regulation impossible until the Vatican decrees are retracted and re; ealed with as much formality as they were promulgated.

The author of the original letter to Cardinal Manning, which first gave color to the report, writes to the Morning Post to-d y, over the same pseudonym, "Presbyter Anglicanus," saying that the letter originated with himself and that he spoke only for himself.

Renewed attention to and discussion of the subject have been a wakened by Lord Penzance's decision yesterday in the Folkstone ritual case, the first sent under the public worship regulation act. The declaration declares the illegal use of the crucifix and station of the cross and solitary communion. Rev. 
