To the Editor:

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I respectfully request the favor of a little space in your extensively read paper, for the purpose of reviving attention to a subject that was commented upon, to a considerable extent, in the "News" columns about fourteen years ago, and that now seems timely to again place before your readers.

The wave of excitement that is passing over the State, at present, is having the good effect of drawing people's thoughts to the need for adopting measures to preserve their health, and prevent infection from contagious diseases, I do not wish to add pro or con to the controversy now disturbing so many minds, in regard to the subject of vaccination, but simply desire to remind the people of some things that, if they will observe them, they may individually dismiss the fears of disease and contagion that have recently become "an empidemic of the mind," in this

section at least. It is an acknowledged fact that fourfifths of the diseases that afflict human-ity are the results of preventable causes, and that errors in diet are responsible for the greater proportion of that percentage. That being the case, it is evident every individual should ex-ercise care in his choice of food and habits of eating. Unfortunately for the human family, culpable carelessness is the rule in this regard, and the multiplication of diseases has been, and con-tinues to be, the result.

The subject of what are healthful ar-ticles of food, and what should not be eaten, is too extensive for the short epistle that I propose writing. Indeed, it is hardly necessary to say much about it, because nearly every physicians and laymen alike, are famillarly acquainted with what is good or bad in their diet, and yet unthinkingly indulge in what they know is deleterious to their health. Parents also, thoughtlessly permit their children to eat things that are injurious. I would earnestly appeal to all to act in this matter according to their light and knowledge; let us not ignore the laws of health we know so well, but sensibly act upon them, not only for our own benefit but, especially, for the preserva-tion of health and prevention of disease among the children. Let the whole people unite in the adoption of proper sanitary regulations, clean their habita tions and surroundings, keep their bodies clean, breathe pure air day and night, eat wholesome food only, and drink pure water. That is the gospel of health, and everybody knows it. Strange, marvelously strange, it is not

interesting and instructive institutes in the Gila Valley, Arizona, Profs. A. J. McClatche, R. H. Forbes and Gordon H. True, from the Arizona Agricultural Experiment Station, came over from the farm and laboratory, Phoenix and Tucson, and aroused con-siderable interest in the various topics interesting to the farming community. Two meetings were held in each of our more prominent towns, Safford, Thatcher and Pima, with a large attendance and much interest manifest. Prof. McClatche, superintendent of the farm, made his talks mostly on the orchard, showing from successful experiments that winter irrigation is a success, especially on orchards and

Prof. Forbes, director, who also is a member of the faculty and stationed at the university, where the laboratory is

the university, where the inhoratory is interested in most on the subject of sugar beet culture, showing conclusive-ly that we had the several necessary elements, especially the community. Arrangements were made for a proper distribution of beet seed and a few re-sponsible parties to try the grawth of them. It was urged by the professor that the upper Giaa valley was the spot in Arizona for a beet sugar facspot in Arizona for a beet sugar fac-

tory. Prof. True, a specialist on dairying talked up this very important indus-try, and urged the necessity of patronizing the creamery here in Thatcher and getting many more of them. These gentlemen were highly gratified with the interest shown here, and the people were benefited by their visit. A dele-gation of one man from each meeting district was elected to meet and ar-range for the perpetuation of these farmer's industries. At the close of the last session they met and elected the principal of the L. D. S. academy as county president, and the instructor of the commercial department as secrezing the creamery here in Thatcher the commercial department as secre tary.
