How Yagol Indians Expelled Mexican Miners.

OHIO GIRLS FOR ARIZONA.

Arizona Experimenting With Sugar Beets—Erasing of an old better—Hiding Waters.

The Portent and Bear rivers in Idaho are already flooding the lowlands along their courses.

The Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railway will expend \$100,000 in New Mexico this year improving its property.

Deming, New Mexico, Headlight Local cattlemen have been busy this week making their spring delivery, which has commenced in good earnest. Over 4,000 head have been shipped from Deming this week, 1,500 head coming from the state of Chihuahua in Old Mexico, the balance being from county stock.

James Ellis, an old timer at Fossil, Wyoming, was drowned at that place Saturday. He was standing on the railroad bridge leading to a farm, when he lost his balance and fell back into the stream, and drowned before he could be rescued. He was the original owner of the Fossil water.

Postville, Idaho, Tribune: George Rust, son of Isaac Rust, died in the district court against E. B. Robinson, his wife, seeking a divorce. He says that they were married at Ogden in 1894, but that his wife has deserted him and returned to live with him. In her answer Mrs. Robinson admits the desertion and intimates that she has good reasons for the same.

The Phoenix, Arizona Gazette prints the following: "Two thousand girls are being shipped out from Ohio to Arizona and New Mexico for the purpose of securing husbands. The W. G. T. U. of the West is at the head of this peculiar movement. Well, as they are to come from Ohio we are mighty glad they are women, for we don't know what the men would do with 2,000 fine-looking girls. There are in Arizona now 800 Ohio men, and every one of them is after a girl and some after position for relative. Yes, send us good-looking, rosy-cheeked girls, but keep your internal office-working brigades at home."

St. Johns, Arizona, Herald: Prof. Wm. Dwyer, director of the University of Arizona, and director of Agricultural Experiment Station at Tucson, was in St. Johns a couple of days this week. He came from Phoenix in company with Hon. John Dwyer, of that place. The mission of Prof. Dwyer was for the purpose of securing the cooperation of some of the farmers of the county in making experiments in the growing of sugar beets during the coming season. An opportunity was given to make a short talk to the people here at a social gathering Wednesday night. He was successful in securing the cooperation of several parties, and the experiments will be scientifically conducted here this year. The result will be awaited with interest.

Glenwood, Colorado, Avalanche: The freshmen in the state school of mines went out in open revolt against the faculty on Arbor day. It all arose through a number of the freshmen class spilling on a piece of sodium, accidentally or otherwise, which caused a smoke in the room. Unable to find the author of the experimentation, the faculty attempted to punish the entire class by firing the examination of the chemistry class on a day different from a day that had been long proposed. This would interfere with a proper celebration of Arbor day, as the students rebelled, and instead of being in their class room on Arbor day they assembled in the campus and planted a tree. They then gave the college yell and dispersed. The faculty in wrath, but the citizens of the town are with the boys.

El Paso, Texas, Times: A. D. McCall arrived in the city yesterday from Nogales and says that one day last week a friendly Yagol Indian came into Nogales from all after, in the state of Sonora, Mexico, and reported that a party of American prospectors had been murdered and two of their number killed by the Indians, twenty-eight miles west of El Paso. According to the Indian report, the Americans—five in number—found an old Indian mine rich with gold and were making out their find when their presence was discovered by the Indians, who called on the prospectors and told them to leave the Yagol country at once and to return to their homes and to leave gold in that country. The Americans declined to accede to this demand, and an hour later they were attacked by a band of thirty Yagols, who killed two of the Americans and had the remainder taken completely in their power, but gave them their life and liberty on their promise to leave the country at once and never attempt to return.
