Her Body, Nearly Decomposed. Found in Trunk in Room of a Friend Chinaman.

### GEN. SIGEL'S GRANDDAUGHTER

Mother Promptly Recognized Parts of Clothing and Jewelry but Father Refuses to Believe it His Child.

New York, June 19 .--- Messages have been sent by the police to Colon and Panama to hold up the party of Chinese who left this city a week ago perterday en route to Vancouver, B. d, in the hope of arresting Leong Lee Lim, alias William H. Lion, who occupied the room in Eighth avenue in which was found last night the trunk containing the body of Miss Fisic Sigel, missionary among the lo-

trunk containing the body of Miss Fisle Sigel, missionary among the lo-cal Chinese, and granddaughter of the famous Gen. Franz Sigel. The police discovered today that Leong Lee Lim started for Vancouver, via Famana, a week ago Friday, the day on which he was last seen at his room over the Eighth avenue chop stey restaurant. In the party for vancouver is said to be also Li Chung, who occupied the room adjoin-ing that which revealed the grew-some tragedy and in which was found some of the murdered girl's cloth-ing, orders were issued to arrest him also. From the condition of the body and other facts, it is believed the crime was committed at least a week before the body was found. Trom Mrs. Margaret Todd, a mis-sionary, who first introduced Miss Sigel into the work of converting the residents of Chinatowh to Christiani-ty, the police learned today that while the young woman taught Leong Lee Lim the creed of Christ, he at the same time learned to love her. From Mrs. Todd's statement and letters found in the room where the body had been strangled, partially strapped and wedged into an old trunk, it has not the only admirer of Elsie Elgel. Letters to Lim threatened him with death if he died not cease his atten-tions to the young missionary. FATHER STILL DOUBTS.

FATHER STILL DOUBTS. Although Mrs. Paul Sigel unhesita-Although Mrs. Paul Sigel unhesita-tingly identified the jewelry and pieces of clothing found in the room as those of her daughter, the girl's father re-fused, even today to believe that the victim was his child. He is said to have started for Washington early to-day in the hope of finding Elsie Sigel alive. Ten days ago a telegram was received from her at Washington saying that she would be home in two days. When she did not arrive the police were notified of her disappear-auce.

motion were notified of her disappear-ance. Mrs. Sigel was so affected by the news of her daughter's fate that to-day she was prostrated and under the care of physicians, and nurses. Both Mr. and Mrs. Sigel knew Leong Lee Lim very well. After the daughter had first met him in charge of a cane rack at a pleasure resort two years ago, she sought to convert him. Her mother who had been in-terested in missionary work among the Chinese for many years, invited the soung Chinaman to their home in the Bronx and during the course of his conversation he was entertained there frequently. Miss Sigel and her parents recently accompanied Lim to a performance in the theater in China-tuwn.

Sun Leong, proprietor of the restau rant, who conducted the rooming housa above, disappeared shortly after the discovery of the murder, adding fur-ther to the mystery. The case has many unusual features, notable among which is the fact that a Chinaman has Mrs. Todd, in ther statement to the police, declared that Lim was very jealous of Miss Sigel and had forbid-den her to accept attentions from any one che. DESERFT EVE been known to call at the Sigel house presumably with the sanction of the parents. Elsie was 20 years old and was geatly interested in work among Chinese. It is understood that she became acquainted with one Chinaman who may be able to throw some light on the case, several years ago, when he conducted a cane rack at an amuse-ment park at Fort George. The Sigel home on Wadsworth avenue, the Bronx, is not far away from that resort. Three Chinamen were arrested as ma-terial witnesses. They gave the names of Meo Kim, manager of Sun Leong's restaurant; Gong Wing, salesman for a chop suey supply house, and Chin Sum, a cook who lived in the rear of the restaurant. The man most wanted, however, is the former occupant of the room where the body was found, evi-dently an English speaking celestial. Judging from the letters this indi-viduent is Leong Loo Lim, known among his English friends as William H. Lion. Shortly ater midnight Mrs. Florence M. Tood, one of the resident workers in the Chinatown and Bowery settle-ment, who is a friend of the Sigel fam-ily called at the morgue and after view-ing the body identified the undercloth-ing as that worn by Elsie Sigel.
