INCREASING WATER SUPPLY

By Improving Water Systems Ladies' Bazar-Marshal Gets Wrong Man. Special Correspondence.

Lehi, Utah, Sept. 27.—At a meeting held Saturday between Morgan Eyans, president of the Lehi Irrigation Co., Mayor James H. Clark of American Fork, and Mayor Wadley of Pleasant Grove, at which Engineer Doremus of Salt Lake City, was present, a plan was evolved to make a large reservoir out of Silver lake in American Fork can-yon. A dam 15 feet high, of cement and concrete, will be put in the outlet of this lake, and the water will be im-pounded for use during the irrigation season, and it is expected that the water supply will be increased very materially. The lake has a surface of about ten acres, and the cost of putting in the dam will be very small. A large iron pipe will be laid in the cement dam to let the water out.

Pleasant Grove was very successful this summer in very materially increasing its water supply from Grove creek, along the same lines. This creek, for about a mile, runs through some very rocky ground, so the Pleasant Grove people made a cement and concrete ditch throughout this ground and were thus successful in doubling their wa-

The water question is a very serious matter at this end of the county and if it can be increased, many more beets would be raised here for the factory. The three local irrigation companies will also tunnel into some springs above Deer creek, and if this proves successful much more work will be done along the same line to increase the water
