A Veteran.—This morning we received a call from Brother Samuel Mulliner, who is now a resident of Porterville. He expressed himself greatly pleased with his new home. The people there live entirely in a united capacity, without individual interests. Peace prevails, and the prosperity of the place is gradually increasing.

Brother Mulliner is conducting the tanning, shoe, harness and saddlery departments of the association, having had a long experience in those branches of business.

Brother Mulliner is a veteran member of the Church. His home in Canada, went to Quincy, Illinois, at which place the Prophet, Joseph Smith, appointed him on a mission to his native country, Scotland, where he opened up the way of the gospel, in Renfrewshire. That was thirty-nine years ago. He was followed a few months subsequently by Elder Otten Pratt, who did an extensive work in that land, building up and establishing many branches of the Church. Brother Mulliner is still a hale, hearty old gentleman.

Sheep-herds.—Settlers in the vicinity of Silver Creek and Chalk Creek are sorely exercised in their feelings over the sheep-herd question. Last season about 7,000 head were pastured there, cleaning the ranges bare and rolling rocks down the sides of the mountains upon the traveled roads. Herds are now being driven to the same locality, and a gentleman, who resides in that part of the Territory, expresses the belief that the settlers will become so exasperated that trouble between them and sheep-owners may probably be the result. He also states that the sheep are frequently driven so close to the settlements as to make them nearly as great a source of annoyance as would the advent of a moderate swarm of grasshoppers.

Those having the charge of sheep-herds should keep their flocks as distant from the settled portions of the Territory as practicable. We advise those who feel themselves injured by the near presence of the sheep, to commit no overt act in the matter. If they seek a remedy at all it should be a peaceful and consistent one.

The Abortion Case.—The examination in the Spinyer abortion case was resumed at 10 o'clock this morning. The prosecuting witness, Mrs. Todd, was subjected to a severe and slight examination by the counsel for the defense. She did not vary, however, from the statements made in her examination in chief, but gave minutest details of the alleged criminal relations between herself and the accused.

Doctors Fowler and Benedict were also placed upon the stand, and were examined as to the physiological and medical aspects of the case, after which the Court took a recess till 2 p.m., at which hour the proceedings were resumed. Mr. Joseph Todd, the woman's husband, being placed on the stand and under examination, for the prosecution.

It appeared unlikely that the case would be concluded to-day.

Accident.—Mr. Jake Houser, gunsmith, yesterday morning, met with a serious accident. He had been repairing and cleaning an improved Winchester repeating rifle, and was testing it with a cartridge. Through some defect in the working of the lever, before the cartridge was sealed in the chamber of the gun, it was accidentally exploded. The ball went through the barrel and entered the floor within an inch of another workman's foot, while the powder flew back into Mr. Houser's face, blinding and hurting his left eye seriously. He is unable to be at work to-day. He is under the treatment of Dr. Benedict.

To Night.—Salisbury's Troubadours will make their first appearance this evening at the Theatre, in a comical, musical and dramatic entertainment called "Patchwork." It belongs to the company and has been performed fifteen hundred times, in various parts of the world. The troupe is highly spoken of by the Australian press.

A "Patchwork" matinee will be given to-morrow, and an extravaganza belonging to the Troubadours entitled "The Brook," will be presented to-morrow evening.

Pleasant Serenade.—Bishop Hickenlooper and wife having just returned from a trip to St. George, Superintendent Goss, of the Ward Sunday School, accompanied by the children and Brother James Swinton, with the choir, serenaded them last night. Some very fine pieces were sung and the Bishop was presented with a large number of very beautiful bouquets. The Bishop was much affected with these manifestations of esteem and good feeling.

The Emigrants.—The first company of Saints from Europe, of this season's emigration, arrived in the city at 9 o'clock last night. They are, as a whole, a fine, healthy lot of people.

The luggage of the company was not brought down last evening, and Elder S. P. News and other returned missionaries went back to Ogden this morning, to superintend its transmission from there to this city to-day.

The Second Game.—The second of the series of games, for the base ball championship, between the Red Stockings and Danesby, will come off to-morrow afternoon, on the club grounds, Washington Square. Parties who take an interest in the national game are on the qui vive.
