Would you please answer through the Naws the following questions and oblige A SUBSCRIMER. Can a teacher of a district school exclude moral citizens and taxpayers in the district from public examination of said school? If a school, examination, etc., are conducted privately, can such a teacher claim support from the public

There is nothing in the school laws that either regulates or requires public school examinations. The Trustees and the County Superintendents are required to make periodical vigits to the schools for the purpose of exami-nation, but the custom of holding public examinations, though an excellen one, is not directed by law. Such meetings are optional with the Teachers and Trustees, and are under their alation. They can make the examp nations private or public as they deem proper, and teachers can claim their proportion of the school tax if they hold a proper certificate of eligibility. The holding of examinations has noth ing to do with that question. School examinations indicionaly conducted are conducive to the progress of education, and the Trustees and Teachers may invite whom they please to be present, limit the visitors to the par-ents of the children or throw the schools
