## BRINGS ACTION FOR DAMAGES.

Rapid Transit Company Sues Mayor Glassman and Others For Tearing Up Track.

## SALARY ORDINANCE VETOED.

All County School Property Now in Hands of County School Board—Success of New Conditions.

Ogden, Utah, Nov. 2.—Mayor William Glassman, Chief of Police T. E. Brown, Road Supervisor L. B. Balch, City Attorney John E. Bagley and Republican Candidate for City Councilman Joseph B. Dana have been served with summons in a damage suit prepared by Attorney C. C. Richards for the Ogden Rapid Transit company, wherein the plaintiff will sue for damages against the defendants in the sum of \$2,500. The suit is the outgrowth of the action on the part of the city officials who last Thursday evening with a large force of policemen and other men went out to the Ogden river bridge and tore up the second track of the Ogden Rapid Transit company across the bridge, causing considerable excitement for a short time, while the work was going on. The street car people have taken time to carefully consider the best steps to take in order to protect their rights and to recover for the damage they sustained. They charge in their complaint that the defendants wantonly and wilfully destroyed the said property of the street car company, destroying the ties, twisting the rails out of shape, etc., all to their damage in the sum of \$2,500.

The action is brought against the five defendants, who are considered the leaders in the work of destroying the track, as it is alleged it was done under their order, direction and personal supervision. The other parties who assisted in the work numbering about 40 men, are not named in the suit because they are considered by the company as only employees of the principals to carry out the work, but because they are not named in this action does not release them from liability should the company decide to later bring an action against them.

There is still a more serious phase to the action of the city officials in tearing up the track. There is a penal statute which makes the malicious and willful tearing up of the track of any railway or car line operated by steam or otherwise, a felony, punishable by imprisonment in the state prison for a term of not more than ten years or less than one year in the county jail. Such an action would have to be brought through the district attorney, but there is little thought of such an action being brought in this case, as no lives or rolling stock of the company or public was endangered.

## CITY COUNCIL SESSION.

Mayor Vetoes Ordinance Increasing Salary of City Officials.

Ogden, Nov. 2.—An adjourned meeting of the city council was held last night.

In his message to the council vetoing the salary ordinance passed by the council on Monday evening, the mayor stated that while it was all right to increase the salaries of the councilmen, chief of police and chief of the fire department, he thought that the taxpayers could not stand any immediate increase in all salaries. He stated that the rate of salary for a city engineer, for example, was sufficient to cause plenty of persons to seek office. The ordinance was amended by the council by cutting out all increases of salaries of appointive officers, and in this condition it will again go to the mayor.

A number of sidewalk improvements were deferred until next year.

The city engineer reported that the paving on Twenty-first street between Washington and Adams avenues was unsatisfactory and he was instructed to withhold the estimate and to accept the rate of the city until it was put in satisfactory condition.

The Ogden Rapid Transit company will be notified to lower the rails at the approach to the Ogden river bridge to meet the grade of the bridge; the present condition is considered dangerous to the public.

Eljah Farr addressed a letter to the council referring to the inexcusable condition of the sidewalk at the intersection of Twenty-first and Washington streets, where a quantity of dirt has been left piled above the sidewalk grade. The matter was referred to the city engineer.

## TRANSFER SCHOOL PROPERTY.

West Weber Trustees the Last to Abandon in Favor of County Board.

Ogden, Nov. 2.—At last all the school districts in Weber county have turned over their money and property to the recently appointed board of education of the county schools. The last to take this step were the trustees of the West Weber school district, who turned over their properties to the board yesterday afternoon. It had been expected that the trustees of this district were opposed to the consolidation of the county schools, but that is not true, they favored the consolidation but did not desire to turn over the property until they felt that the new board would be ready to make the transfer which was immediately done.

The consolidation is working wonderfully well in Weber county. Greater satisfaction is felt by Supt. Patterson, the teachers and all connected with the schools, as now the teachers are all under the supervision of one head, and can work to better advantage and advancement, and if pupils move from one district to another they can continue in their studies, as though no change had been made.

## TAXES COMING IN SLOWLY.

County Treasurer Chambers has only collected a little over \$70,000 of the taxes for 1905, which is less than one-sixth of the total amount of taxes to be collected in Weber county this year. The total taxes to be collected is \$425,000, an increase of \$21,000 over last year. Mr. Chambers says that the amount collected up to date compares favorably with other years. The majority of the taxpayers came in the last week, making the work in the treasurer's office very heavy. There are only two more weeks before taxes will become delinquent.

## SALARY ORDINANCE VETOED.

By Mayor Roylance Who Objects to Increase of Certain Salaries.

Special Correspondence.

Provo, Utah, Nov. 2.—Mayor Roylance has vetoed the salary ordinance passed by the council last Monday. The following communication sets out the reasons for the veto:

Provo City, Utah, Nov. 1, 1905.

W. E. Harding, City Recorder, Provo, Utah.

Dear Sir:—I beg to return herewith without my approval. "An ordinance providing for the salaries and compensations of elected officers and appointive officers of Provo City, Utah," for the reason that the work performed by some of these officers does not warrant the increase of salary. Take for instance the office of city attorney, the increase is not sufficient to induce a man with the proper legal training to take the office and I believe the salary as at present established is sufficient for the amount of work performed by the city attorney; because whenever a case of any importance is brought against the city, or in which the city is at all interested, we are compelled to seek legal services, for which we have to pay additional, so that I think the salary as already established as compensation for the city attorney is sufficient for the work he does without the legal help referred to above. Also the increase in the salary of city recorder is not justified by the amount of work done at the present time. If the duties of the city recorder could be specified so that he could be required to do all the clerical work of the city departments, I might consent to said increase but not in the form that the ordinance reads as submitted.

These reasons coupled with the fact that the work as outlined and contemplated by Provo is such that the revenues of the city will not justify the present time are already burdened with taxes, and I believe the strictest economy should be used, and the increase of salary should be deferred until the next year.

## SALT LAKE MAN FILLS VACANCY.

L. S. Hills Succeeds Late Judge Dee as Vice President First National Bank.

## INSTITUTION IS FLOURISHING.

Ogden, Nov. 2.—Ed Pennell was arraigned before Judge Murphy this morning, charged with having burglarized the Gasberg roominghouse on Twenty-fifth street, and stealing therefrom a coat. His bond was fixed at \$250, but the preliminary hearing has not yet been held.

## BANK FLOURISHING.

At a meeting of the board of directors of the First National bank in this city last night, Lewis S. Hills, president of the Deseret National bank of Salt Lake, was elected vice president and director to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Judge Thomas D. Dee. The board decided to increase the bank's circulation to \$100,000, and purchased government bonds to cover the amount. The reports made were of a very satisfactory nature.

## ROOT CONGRATULATES FLAMMER ON WITHDRAWAL.

New York, Nov. 2.—Eljah Root, secretary of state, has written to Judge Chas. A. Flammer a letter congratulating him on his withdrawal from the race for district attorney in favor of Dist. Atty. Jerome. The secretary's letter follows:

"My Dear Judge Flammer: I congratulate you upon your withdrawing from the race for district attorney. It was public spirited and wise, and shows the qualities which have made you such a good judge and such a good citizen.

The selection of a district attorney is not so much a question of one party or another, as it is of all honest people against all dishonest and criminal elements of every kind. Jerome seems to have a good chance of election, and his election would be a great thing for New York. He has vigor and fearlessness and enthusiasm. In the cause of justice, and hence a thief's ad cannot be hushed up or put to sleep by any influence whatsoever. Every man who cares about his country and law-abiding town ought to be for him.

## Japanese Loan Not Certain.

London, Nov. 2.—M. Takahashi, the financial agent of Japan, answering an inquiry regarding the report that a Japanese loan of \$200,000,000 had been issued here today, informed the Associated Press yesterday that nothing has yet been decided in regard to issuing a new loan.

## Bonaparte on Negro Votes.

Cumberland, Md., Nov. 2.—Secy. of the Navy Charles J. Bonaparte, addressing a Republican rally here last night, said among other things:

"Rogers cry out because the negro votes, but the negro has now voted 28 years, and if we have decided to vote so long, surely he will not ruin us if we make the time 39 years, or 40 years. It is hard to say just what harm his voting has done (unless it be that he has selected the right man to retain power by playing upon race prejudice) for whenever Democratic speakers or writers get to this point in the discussion they have apostrophized that terrible man, making 'niggerphobia' and begin to shriek and form at the mouth so that a straight-jacket and padded cell seem to be next in order."

## New Ship Bounty Scheme.

New London, Conn., Nov. 2.—President Charles R. Hanson of the Eastern Shipbuilding Co., which has but the big steamship Minnesota and Dakota for the Pacific trade, issued a statement yesterday in which he favors taxation of all shipping entering American ports, the revenue thus derived to be used in paying bounty based on per ton of cargo carried per mile in American built ships. Mr. Hanson states that under the provisions of this proposed bill the foreign ship owner having the largest amount of shipping will be used to encourage the building of American ships by American labor and in American shipyards.

The capital stock is \$25,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$100 each. N. O. Ogden is president and treasurer; A. M. Ogden, vice president and secretary, and these, with Harry Jackson, Morris Flowers and Elijah Farr form the directorate.

## FELL INTO MANHOLE.

In the district court this morning before Judge Howell, the case of Fred Stauffer, Jr., by his guardian ad litem, Fred Stauffer, Sr., against Ogden City was called for trial. The suit is brought to recover the sum of \$5,000 for injuries alleged to have been received through the boy, who is 11 years of age, falling into a sewer manhole on Twenty-first street, sustaining injuries which rendered him deaf in the left ear and caused the permanent disability of the left leg.

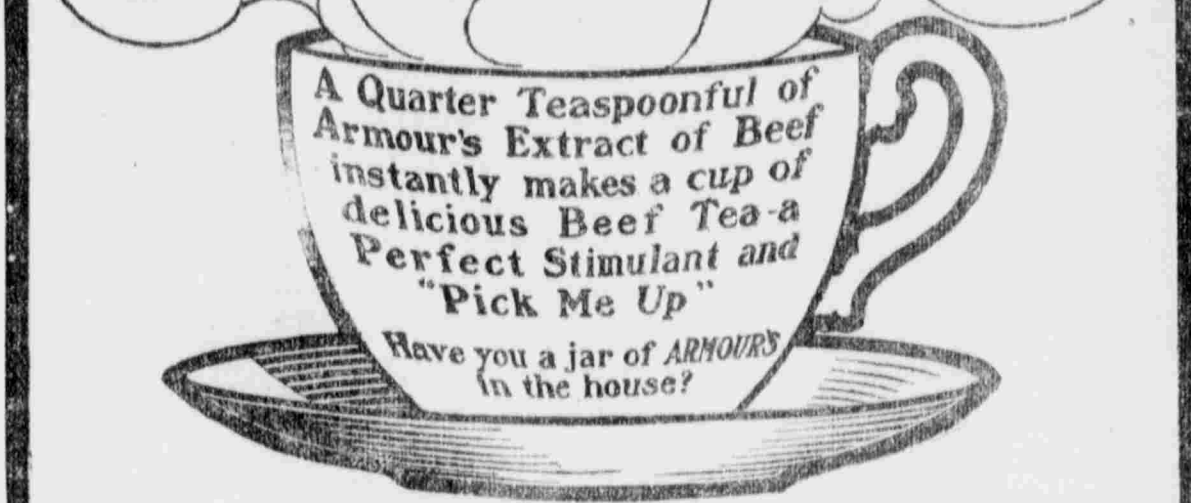
