## WILLARD.

NAUVOO VETERAN CALLED.  
Benjamin Taylor Closes Honored Career at Age of 93.

Willard, Boxelder Co., Dec. 15.—Benjamin Taylor, who died Dec. 11, was born in Leedbury, Herefordshire, England, Dec. 15, 1814, and was within four days of the ripe age of 93. He was a wheelwright by trade. When he was

23 he married Mary Ann Fener. In 1840 he accepted the gospel and emigrated to America the following year, settling in Nauvoo. Here he suffered much through sickness and poverty. He emigrated to Utah in 1859 and the following year settled at Willard where he has since resided.

Father Taylor was of that strong, stalwart type so common among the early pioneers. His honest, simple life, his devotion to duty and his unwavering testimony have been a powerful factor for good among his associates.

He is survived by five children, 40 grandchildren and 63 great-grandchildren.

FUNERAL OF MISS POULSON.  
Young Man from Monroe Accused of Grand Larceny.

Richfield, Dec. 13.—The funeral over the remains of Miss Serena Poulson, who passed away on the 11th inst., were held today at the first ward meeting-house. The speakers were Joseph H. Erickson, A. G. Young and Henry N. Hayes. Words of sympathy for the bereaved and commendation of the beautiful life of the deceased were pressed. The music was furnished by the Richfield quartet. The floral tributes were profuse and a large cortege accompanied the remains to the cemetery.

Miss Poulson was 26 years of age. She was a dressmaker and lived with her widowed mother. Miss Poulson was a daughter of Neils and Caroline Poulson, and a sister of Postmaster N. C. Poulson. Her life was full of kindness and self-sacrifice and worthy of emulation.

## ACCUSED OF GRAND LARCENY.

VETERAN OF 72 CALLED.  
William E. Chappell Closes Honored and Busy Career.

Coalville, Summit Co., Dec. 13.—William E. Chappell, aged 72 years, died here Dec. 9. He was born in Berry-narbour, Devonshire, England, February, 1835. Was married to Hannah Lake, Jan. 8, 1859; baptized in the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, in 1857; emigrated to the United States in 1861; came to Utah the year following and located in Coalville in 1868, where he has lived ever since. He has held many prominent offices in the Church; acted in the bishopric in the East; Coalville ward for many years also held the position of superintendent of Sunday schools for a number of years. He attended Sabbath school and meeting last Sunday and was taken suddenly ill that night and died Monday. Funeral services were held today, the speakers were Elders John P. Wild, James Staples, W. W. Cluff, Alma Eldredge and William H. Branch, all spoke highly of the de-

ceased who was respected by all who knew him.
