HOT SHOT FROM JUDGE BOTKIN.

Pitches Into the "Americans" at A Rally Held in the Grand Theater Saturday Night.

LEADERS ROUNDLY SCORED.

Challenges Them to a Discussion of Some of the Charges Made During the Campaign.

The Republicans held forth at the Grand theater Saturday night, the speakers being Hon. J. A. Largent and Judge Theodosius Botkin. The meeting was presided over by Hon. H. E. Booth and good music was furnished by the Utah State band, the Young Men's Republican quartet and the colered Republican Barijo and Quartet club. The boxes and seats on the stage were occupied by prominent state, county and city officials.

Mr. Largent was first introduced and for 40 minutes discussed in forcible style, national issues. He made frequent allusion to the "new" movement and roundly scored some of the leaders thereof who, like the chameleon, changed their spots to suit their own whims and fancies. Such characters, he said, were not to be depended upon. JUDGE BOTKIN'S SPEECH.

Judge Botkin followed. Discussing the political status of the state of Utah, he said: "There are many of you who remember with me the cheering prosects of the great Republican party at the beginning of the last week in Oc-tober, 1884. We felt as sure then as we feel now that on the ides of November, Republican principles would be tri-umphant and that the great Plumed Knight, the greet statesman of his time, would surely be elected president time, would surely be elected president of the United States. You older people remember that at the beginning of that week, the campaign managers of the national Democracy were in the border-land of despair and virtually conceded the triumph of the Republican party. You also remember how a trivial expension of the New York banquet fallyou also remember how a trivial expression at a New York banquet, falling from the livs of a sincere friend, revolutionized the whole situation and cast the great Republican party and its magnificent leader down into the very depth of defeat. We must all remember that oftentimes the smallest member that oftentimes the smallest and most insignificant causes produce the most stupendous and lasting ef-You know that a 'microbe can kill a monarch or a mighty conqueror; you know that a simple crawfish, bor-ing its way through a Dutch dyke, caused first a crevasse and then a break that allowed the German ocean to roll in upon the continent of Eu-rope, destroying untold wealth, numerous populous towns and cities and myriad of people, and dotted the map of Europe with the great Zuyder Zee. You know that a eackling goose caused the defeat of an overwhelming army of Gauls, and saved the Esternal the simple alliterative expression 'Rum, Romanism and Rebellion' de-feated the magnetic and magnificent statesman, James G. Blaine, and impesed upon the country the stuffed prophet from Buffalo.

"Now we do not know and we can-not know what trivial accident or what untoward incident may yet occur in this campaign to revolutionize the entire situation and once more throw this country with all its industrial enterprises, with all its bright and pros-perous conditions, down into that gloom which always follows a national triumph of a tariff tinkering, free trade Democracy, and if such accident or incident should occur, causing the great states of New York, New Jersey, Connecticut and West Virginia to turn over into the Democratic column, the three electoral votes from this young state of Utah may be needand insure the election of our present splendid standard-bearer, that true d tried friend of the great arid west, Theodore Roosevelt."

"AMERICANISM."

The speaker then turned his attention to the attitude of the instigator and some of the controlling leaders of the new "American" party, toward Roosevelt and the Republican issues and Republican principles, in this campaign. He paid due respect to the manhood party and said:

Many of these people are my best and most appreciated friends. I know them to be honest in their motives and patriotic in their purposes. I know they have joined this new party with a sincere desire to right some of the al-leged wrongs existing in this city, and for the great rank and file of the 'American' party I have unbounded respect and believe that they are as noble men and women as any community in the world can produce; but these men and women have been, and are being de-ceived and misled by a small coterie of as unscrupulous political demamen, or brought disgrace to this or any other country, and I want the rank and file of the "American" party to dis-tinctly understand that what I shall say concerning those unscrupulous leaders will not be intended to apply to the men and women who compose the rank and file of that party. I have said that they are deceiving and mis-leading you and I shall prove it.

CHARGES CONSIDERED.

"It is charged against them that they are in collusion with the leaders of the Democratic party to throw Utah into the Democratic ranks—to defeat, if possible, the national Republican party, and enable them to say after the election, as they spread themselves like turkey gobblers in the presence of the administration at Washington: you see, you can't carry Utah without us and our help, and hereafter when you have any favors to bestow in the great west, you must consult us and obey our dictates or you cannot regain your lost prestige in Utah.'

"To that charge they plead not guilty, in language more forcible than polite, and upon the issues thus made, I challenge them here tonight to a discussion before the great jury, their fellow citizens. I am willing to submit the proof of their guilt to a jury composed alone of the great rank and file of the American party and all I ask is a fair and candid consideration of the facts

and circumstances." The speaker then called attention to the fact that while the great instigator, Senator Kearns, and the leaders, Lipp-Nelson and Nye, were loud in protestations of friendship toward Roosevelt, they had purposely bmitted from the official ticket of the "American" party any mention of presidential electors. "Do not tell me," said he, "that they knew no better, for that would be branding those asjute polltleians and political managers as fools; do not tell me that they forgot to place the electoral candidates upon their ticket, for that would be brand-

MENDACIOUS TRIB STORY EXPLODED.

Unwarranted Attack on Church And County Commissioner James H. Anderson.

"UNCOOKED" FIGURES.

Official Denial of the Latest Fake Sprung by the Organ of the Fleshpot Hunters.

The Church in general, and Hon. James H. Andersen in particular, were the objects of a mendacious attack in Sunday's issue of the Sait Lake Tribune. Briefly stated, it charged Mr. Anderson with being "the tool of the Church," In seeing that Church poor were fed at county expense, and that the orders issued to such were made on Church institutions, giving them at least 70 per cent of this business.

Those who know anything at all about county affairs, are cognizant of the fact that Mr. Anderson has practically nothing to do with the pauper business of the county. This depart-ment is looked after almost entirely by Commissioner Standish, a non-'Mor-mon," who is chairman of the pauper committee, and under whose direction all pauper orders are issued. In this connection Pauper Cierk Sabine said today that in the distribution of funds to the poor, religious lines are not drawn. the only conditions being inquired into being the ability of the individual to work and the amount of means, if any, at his command. If found in sore straite in these particulars, relief is granted without further questions being asked. Mr. Sabine further stated that orders issued on whatever business house parties concerned desire to deal

with, there being absolutely no discrim-ination, as charged by the Tribune. As to the county infirmary, Mr. Sabine states that there are at present in that institution a total of 104 inmates. Of these 24 are "Mormons" and 80 non-"Mormons," thus giving the lie to the malicious statement that as they are practically all of one, faith, they are readily made to do the bidding of Mr. Anderson and his political associates. Mr. Sabine says the records are open to the public, and that those who will take the trouble to examine them will find that the Tribune article has absolutely no foundation in fact, but that it is a malicious attempt to like remarkle elemalicious attempt to libel reputable citizens to further its own dastardly ends.

JAPANESE IMPERIAL PRINCE IS COMING.

Washington, Oct. 23 .- It was announced authoritatively today that the urpose of the emperor of Japan in sending on a visit to this country his adopted brother, his imperial highness Prince Fushimi, who will reach San Francisco about the middle of November, is to strengthen by every appropriate means the traditional friendship between the United States and Japan, Mr. Kogoro Takahira, the Japanese minister at Washington, in a conversation at the legation, said:

"When a person of dignity travels in a foreign country it is almost always the case that the occasion is used to start some speculation in regard to the object of his journey. So I do not expect that exception should be made of the yish of his imperial highness, to attribute it to the so-called change in American feeling as represented by some newspapers is enetirely a 'guess' from wild imagination. "The prince's visit to this country

the princes visit to this country was originally brought into consideration as long ago as last spring, but as it was a part of its object to see the world's fair at St. Louis, it was considered advisable to defer it to the autumn, when the exhibits would be in a more complete form for observation, nd for that reason this time was hosen for his visit.

"There is, of course, no question about the principal object of his visit being to strengthen thereby the tie of genuine friendship so happily existing be-tween the United States and Japan in a most appropriate manner, but not in such 'patchwork' fashion as has been reported in some quarters.
"His highness will maintain his offi-

cial status as imperial prince only at Washington and St. Louis, but in all other cities he will travel incognito. This is another evidence that he is not oming here to start a 'boom,' as has

been reported. "After his visit to the fair, where he will be particularly interested to see that wonderful display of American genius and energy, he will visit the educational, commercial and industrial centers of this country, such as Boston, Philadelphia, New York, Pittsburg. Chicago, etc., to study the true causes of the greatness of the United States, and also of the legitimate influence of this great republic in the far east.

"As to the so-called change in the American sentiment toward Japan so often alluded to recently in some news-papers, I do not feel it at all. It may be because I have not been subject to a fit of nervousness for some time that I do not feel such a change, if there is any. But in my opinion, so long as Japan has nothing in her motive nor action to reflect on her that may be considered prejudicial to the legitimate interest of all nations she has no fear of losing the friendship of any people and even if there should occur some deviation in this sentiment through misunderstanding or on account of mis-hievous agencies, such misunderstandng soon must disappear, inasmuch as here is no real ground for its exist-We are not afraid of any such misunderstanding, but we implicitly rely upon the keen intelligence and good sense of the American people for a correct judgment of our cause and

Mr. Pierce, the third assistant secretary of state, and Mr. Takahira are now preparing the program for the entertainment of the prince.
