MOFFAT AGAIN.

DenverRaffroad Builder Granted a Con cession in Old Mexico.

The Mexican government yesterday granted to David H. Moffat millionaire and builder of the Denver, Northwestern & Pacific road, and to a group of capitalists allied with him, including George Gould, a concession or a rail-road 1,500 miles long to be built entirein Mexico.

The railroad is to start from Agua Priet, pust across the northern line of the Mexican state of Sonora and within the United States. From this point the road is to run to the Yaqui river and follow it to the gulf of California. From there to run southward to Topolobampo where it will connect with the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient, and then again southward to the city of Guadalajara, making the total length of the road .500 miles.

The road will open up some of the richest regions in the sister republic, which have been inaccessible bitherto. 'he districts are especially rich in mineral resources and it is understood that Mr. Moffat and the other members of the syndicate have already secured vast concessions along the route of the new

The announcement that Mr. Moffat has decided to become a railroad builder on a gigantic scale, created some surprise in railroad circles here, where was not even dreamed that he had decided to enter the southern republic. It is generally thought that the financeering of the Moffat road brought its promoter into contact with the capitalists who are now associated with him.-Denver Post.
