

Thatcher. He has heretofore supported Henderson. Wright and Parry left Henderson and voted for Rawlins. A. P. Sorenson, a Rawlins supporter, was absent on account of sickness in his family. The three Republicans voted for Lafayette Holbrook and the four Populists for H. W. Lawrence. Senator Cannon voted for O. W. Powers.

WEDNESDAY'S VOTE.

Two ballots for United States Senator were taken today, but so far as the three leading candidates are concerned there was not the slightest change from the situation as it stood yesterday at the close of balloting. After taking two ballots the joint session dissolved to meet again at noon tomorrow.

The three Republicans gave George M. Cannon a complimentary vote, while the four Populists remembered Warren Foster in the same way.

THURSDAY'S VOTE.

The first ballot today, the thirty-second in all, resulted precisely as did the last one yesterday, so far as the three leading candidates were concerned, except that Speaker Perkins, who has been supporting Thatcher, voted for Fisher S. Harris, and Callie, who has been a Rawlins man, voted for R. C. Chambers. This ballot gave Rawlins 17, Henderson 14 and Thatcher 21. The four Populists voted for Mrs. E. K. LaBarthe, and the three Republicans voted for Thomas Kearns. Senator Cannon again voted for Powers. A. P. Sorenson was still absent.

The only change in the next ballot, the 33rd, was the defection of Martin, who left Thatcher and voted for Harris. On the next ballot, the 34th, the only change was made by Bennion,

who left Rawlins and voted for Harris. This gave the latter three votes, viz. Bennion, Martin and Perkins. Callie voted each time for Chambers. This caused a loss of two votes each to Thatcher and Rawlins. Henderson held his 14 solid.

On the announcement of the result of the third ballot, Roylance, a Thatcher supporter, moved that the joint session dissolve. Carried. The record of the last ballot was as follows:

FRIDAY'S VOTE.

On the first ballot today, Dotson went from Thatcher to Rawlins, and Perkins from Thatcher to Henderson, which were the only changes from the last ballot of yesterday which affected the leading candidates. Bennion and Martin voted for Fisher S. Harris, and the four Populists gave Senator Cannon a complimentary vote. The Republicans voted for Attorney General A. C. Blain, Callie for R. C. SATURDAY'S VOTE.

On the first ballot today, the 38th in all, the following changes were made from the last one taken yesterday: Dotson, Martin, Wilson and Shepard left Rawlins and voted for Thatcher, and Perkins left Henderson and went to Thatcher. This raised Thatcher's total from 19 yesterday to 24, and gave Rawlins 13 and Henderson 14.

On this ballot the four Populists voted for Judge M. M. Kellogg, Bennion voted for Fisher S. Harris, Senator Cannon for O. W. Powers, Callie for R. C. Chambers and the three Republicans for Mrs. Emmellie B. Wells.

On the second ballot of today, Bennion changed his vote from Harris to O. W. Powers, and Harbour, Dresser and Thompson, three of the Populists, voted for Thatcher, giving him 27. This was the only change.

On the third ballot of today Callie left Chambers and voted for Rawlins, and the remaining Populist, Mangan, voted for Thatcher, giving him 28. On this ballot Henderson and Rawlins each received 14 votes.

Two more ballots were taken with no result except that Kenner, who had been voting for Rawlins, was excused from voting.

MONDAY'S VOTE.

On the first ballot taken today, the 43rd in all, Thatcher, who had 28 votes on Saturday, received 26. Speaker Perkins left him and voted for Fisher S. Harris and Shepard and Wilson left him and returned to Rawlins. But Senator Cannon, who had been voting for Powers, supported him, making his net loss two.
