

FEARFUL MASSACRE IN NORTH BORNEO

Rebels Swoop Down Upon Kawang Station and Butcher a Hundred And Thirty People.

NO RECORD OF THE WOUNDED.

It Was a Debauch of Savagery and Only Ended When There Were No More Victims.

Portland, May 12.—A special to the Telegram from Victoria, B. C., says: Missionary passengers by the liner Empress of India being advised of an atrocious massacre on the west coast of British North Borneo. On March 31 at 10 o'clock at night a band of 150 rebels from the interior, armed with guns, parangs, spears and blow-pipes, swept down upon the little colony at Kawang railway station, midway between Jesselton and Pagar. The band divided into two parts, one of a hundred remaining concealed as a reserve on the top of the hill, while the other 50 rushed down upon the settlement, butchered the inmates of the Chinese shops, attacked the railway station, smashed the telephone and killed the wife and child of the station master, the latter

Distinguished Dane Arrives.

San Francisco, May 12.—L. Bramen of Copenhagen, former minister of the interior of Denmark, has arrived here from the orient. For 10 years prior to his elevation to the ministry he was

identified a signed statement which he obtained from Harrison J. Barrett, showing the amount of retainer received by Barrett and Nellis as counsel for bond investment companies between Jan. 1 and March 1, 1904, and by Mr. Tyler subsequent to the latter date. The total was \$10,441, received from 22 different companies. The statement testified that Mr. Barrett stated his income for a little more than two years had been \$80,000, including fees from all classes of business before the postoffice department. On objection the answer of Mr. Barrett was ordered stricken out. The trial will be continued tomorrow.

RUSSIAN MAIL.

United States Will Change Route And Avoid Capture.

Washington, May 12.—Apparently to avoid the risk of Russian mail falling into the enemy's hands, the Russian government has requested the United States to change the route of all mails sent from or through this country for Manchuria and Siberia. In accordance with the notification the following general order, addressed to postal employees throughout the country, was issued today by the postoffice department:

"Hereafter and until further orders, mails destined for Siberia and Manchuria should be forwarded to New York to be included in mails for Russia made up at the New York office."

The significance of this action lies in the fact that until now the mails for Siberia and Manchuria have been sent over the Siberian railway, going first to San Francisco and thence via Chinese or Japanese ports to a Siberian railway point.

Shop Hours Reduced.

Livingston, Mont., May 12.—The management of the Northern Pacific shops here inaugurated a change in the shops whereby a day's work for the shopmen will consist of nine hours instead of ten, as heretofore.

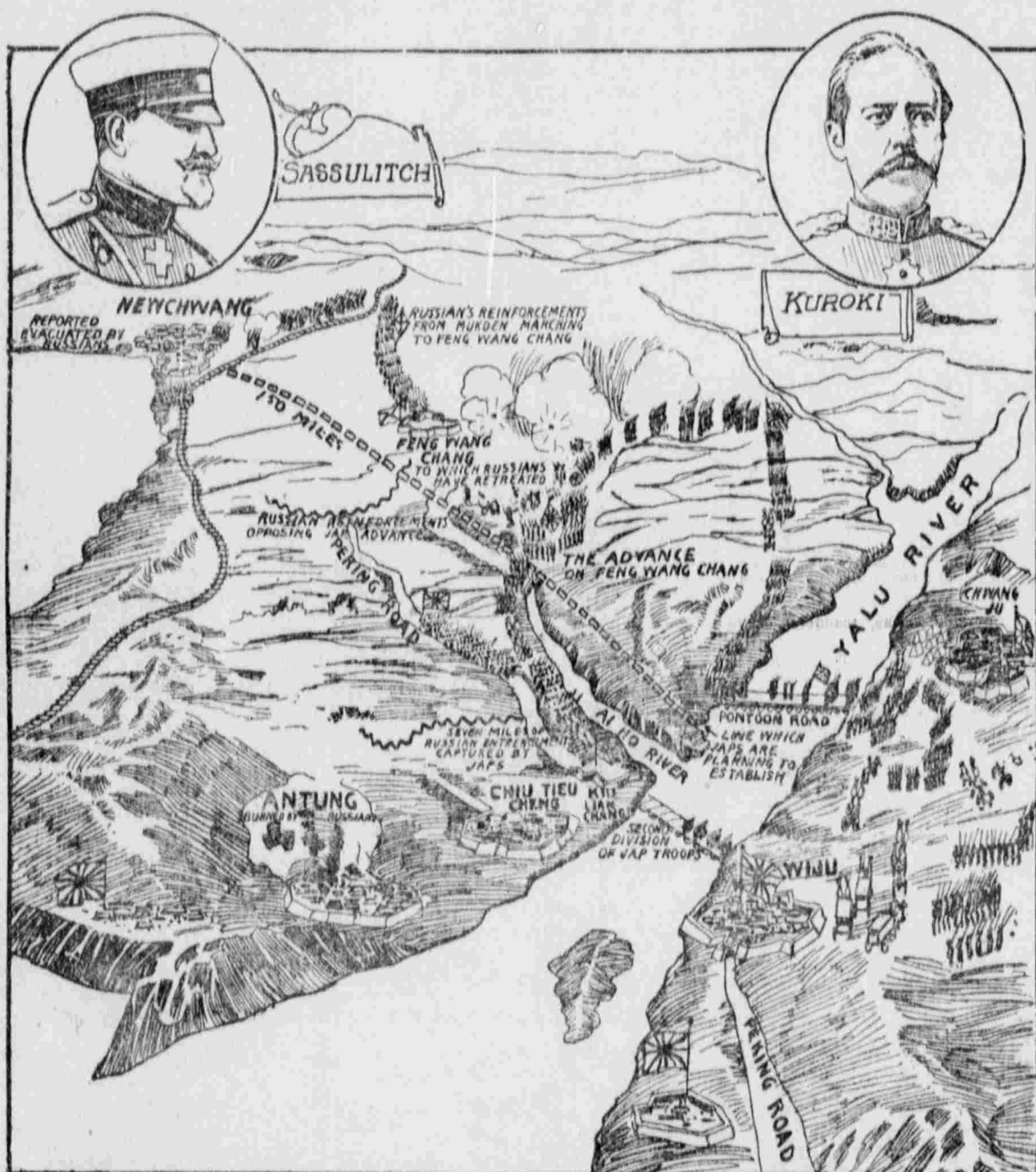

PRESENT DISPOSITION OF THE RUSSIAN AND JAPANESE TROOPS IN EASTERN MANCHURIA.

The map shows how the Russian and Japanese troops are at present disposed in eastern Manchuria as well as the line which the Japanese hope to establish and maintain. It will be seen that should they succeed in this purpose it will be a difficult matter for the enemy, save with overwhelming numbers, to make a move. General Sasulitch, who commanded the Russians in the first great battle of the Yalu, has, after the Russian fashion, been relieved of his command. General Kuroki, the Japanese commander, is seeking to extract the greatest possible strategic advantage from his unequivocal victory.

saving his life by hiding in the bush. The band of murderers turned their attention to the bodies, most of them Chinese, killing and wounding them savagely right and left. The English railway driver was the next victim, a speedy and terrible end coming to him and his wife. The carnage then became general, males, females and innocent babes being butchered in the lust for blood. The houses and huts in the brutal career of the savages, and when nothing was left but dead bodies and cruelly wounded people, ashes and desolation, the sanguinary wretches went their way.

The survivors—one native fireman, the station master, with a few of the wounded coolies—ran down the line in the direction of Jesselton for their lives. By putting all steam on the construction engine stationed here, the terrible news was carried to Jesselton, putting all the inhabitants of that place in panic.

The total number of killed was 130. No record is available of the number of wounded.

BARRETT AS A LOBBYIST.

Gen. Tyner Recommended Him a Very Valuable.

Washington, May 12.—In the Tyner-Barrett trial today, Asst. Dist. Atty. Tugwell led in the jury three letters written by Gen. Tyner, recommending Mr. Barrett to President Hayes of the Southern Pacific railway. President Stevens of the Chesapeake & Ohio, and Vice President and General Manager of the Baltimore & Ohio. Gen. The night watchman was the only person about the mill at the time, and was so scorched by the flames which attended the explosion that it was only with difficulty that he was able to turn in a fire alarm. Owing to this delay and the distance from the nearest fire apparatus the Day mill was almost destroyed before the department arrived on the scene. From the Day mill the flames jumped to the Powers mill and the trunk factory, and despite the efforts of the firemen these structures were rapidly enveloped in flames. Although the fire department fought with desperation the highly inflammable character of the buildings and their contents rendered their efforts futile and all three buildings were burned to the ground. All of the mills carried some insurance but at this hour it is impossible to state the amount.

Board of Fire Underwriters.

New York, May 13.—At its 28th annual meeting which has just closed here, the national board of fire underwriters elected John W. Washburn president to succeed Henry H. Hall. Fifty-eight companies were represented, including many doing business in the south and west.

Topeka, Kan., May 12.—David Overmier, one of the delegates at large from Kansas to the Democratic national convention, announced tonight he would make every effort to have the Kansas delegation support Gen. Miles for the Democratic nomination for president. Kansas Democrats have chosen an unopposed delegation. Hearst claims half of the number. Overmier has been looked upon as a Hearst man. He says the Democrats could easily elect Gen. Miles.

Treasurer and Treasure Gone.

San Francisco, May 12.—Everett Abbott, formerly treasurer of the American Marine Transportation company of Boston, who left that city on March 15, was arrested in this city today on a charge of having embezzled from his employers \$5,552. The arrest was made by Detective Edward Gibson. It is understood that Abbott will not attempt to resist extradition to Massachusetts.
