Portland, May 12 .- A special to the Telegram from Victoria, B, C., says: Missionary passengers by the liner Empress of India bring advices of an atrocious massacde on the west coast of British North Borneo. On March 31 at 10 o'clock at night a band of 150 rebels from the interior, armed with guns, parangs, spears and blow-pipes, swept down upon the little colony at Rawang rallway station, midway be tween Jesselton and Papar. RUSSIAN MAIL.

United States Will Change Route And Avoid Capture.

And Avoid Capture. Washington, May 12.—Apparently to avoid the risk of Russian mail failing into the enemy's hands, the Russian gov-ernment has requested the Enited States to charge the route of all mails sent from or through this country for Manchuria and Siberia. In accordance with this no-tilication the following general order, al-dreased to postal employes throughout the country, was basued today by the postoffice department: — "Hereafter and until further ordera, shold be forwarded to New York to be included in mails for Russia made up at the lact that until new the mails for Si-berta and Manchuria have been sent over the Siberias railway, going first to San-Pracisco and thence via Chinese or Jap-anese ports to a Siberian railway point.

#### Shop Hours Reduced.

#### PRESENT DISPOSITION OF THE RUSSIAN AND JAPANESE TROOPS IN EASTERN MANCHURIA

The map shows how the Russian and Japanese troops are at present disposed in eastern Manchuria as well as the line which the Japanese hope to establish and maintain. It will be seen that should they succeed in this purpose it will be a difficult matter for the enemy, save with overwhelming numbers, to make a forward mova. General Sassulitch, who commanded the Russians in the first great battle of the Yalu, has, after the Russian fashion, been relieved of his command. General Kuroki, the Japanese commander, is seeking to extract the greatest possible strategic advantage from his unequivocal victory.

The band of murderers turned their attention to the coolies, most of them Chinese, killing and wounding them Chinese, killing and wounding them savagely right and left. The English railway driver was the next victim, a speedy and terrible end coming to him and his wife. The carnage then be-came general, males, fomales and in-nocent babes being butchered in the lust tor blood. The houses and huts in the Kampong were set fire to next in the brutal career of the savages, and when nothing was left but dead bodies and cruelly wounded people, ashes and desolution, the sanguinary wretches went their way. The survivors—one native fireman,

wretches wort their way. The survivors—one native fireman, the station master, with a few of the wounded coolies—ran down the line in the direction of Jesseiton for their lives. By putting all steam on the construction engine stationed there, the terrible news was carried to Jesseiton, putting all the inhabitants of that place in panic.

The total number of killed was 120. No record is available of the number of wounded.

The night's watchman was the only person about the util at the time, and was so scorched by the flames which at-tended the explosion that it was only with difficulty that he was able to turn by a fire alarm. Owing to this delay and the distance from the nearest fire apparatus the Day mill was almost des-troyed laters the department arrived on the scene. From the Day mill the flames jumped to the Powers mill and the trunk factory, and despite the ef-forts of the firemen - these structures were rapidly inveloped in flames. Although the fire department fought with desperation - the buildings and their contents rendered their efforts ru-tils and all three buildings were burned to the ground. All of the mills carried some insurance but at this near it is inpossible to state the amount.
