FAR REACHING LEGAL DECISION.

Votions for New Trials Must be Filed Within Time Specified-Decision in Damage Cases.



city Council Session-To Repave Twenty-Fifth Street-Weber County Affairs-Livestock Improvement.

Judge H. H. Rolapp has rendered his decision in the motion for a new trial in the damage cases of Jane L. Warner and Georgia Crocker against the Union Pacific. Both cases were struck from the files of the court, as both motions were filed too late. In the former case a verdict was rendered against the defendant for \$5,460 and the othercase for \$12,000. These actions were both for injuries which resulted in the

death of the plaintiffs' husbands. In effect Judge Rolapp holds that a trial judge has no right to extend time fer filing a motion for a new trial, and that even if he had such right, two mistakes were made in the procedure under consideration which would have proved fatal to its validity. The de-fense had until Nov, 26 to file the mo-tion for a new trial. Nov, 26 being a holiday, the attorney for the defense, Le Grand Young, waited till the next day and then secured by telephone from Judge Rolapp, who was in Farmington, onsent for the extension of the time Judge Agee for one of the plaintffs held that the word "until" meant up to and or Nov. 26, and even if the date had not been a holiday, the filing could not have been made.
