BRIEF TELEGRAMS.

The pension appropriation bill
appropriating \$100,000,000 passed the
House.

A hundred more freight handlers
in New York have struck. Work is
almost at a standstill at the piers.

Henry Huddleston (colored), was
lynched last night at Winchester,
Tenn., for raping Widow Vaughn.

The Grand Jury came into the
criminal court this afternoon and
made three new presentments in the
Star Route cases.

E. C. Ingersoll, counsel for the
plaintiff in the Christianity divorce
suit, has been pronounced insane
and taken to an asylum.

The naval appropriation bill which
will be printed and printed, and
appropriates \$15,352,000
or \$50,000 more than last year.

The political pressure being
brought to bear on Governor Cor-
nell, of New York, to induce him
to refrain from vetoing the
railroad tax bill. It is thought, how-
ever, that it will become a law.

The general impression is that
Congress can away somewhere be-
tween the 10th and 15th of July,
but if the tariff revenue bill is
taken up it is likely that Congress
may be kept in session till the 20th.

At Cincinnati advice from in-
telligent and reliable sources in
Warren County make the loss to
the barley crop from the rust
worm and water fifty per cent.
The worm is attacking the corn to
some extent, but has not yet harm-
ed the wheat.

It is said the recent visit of Pres-
ident Roberts, of the Pennsylvania Com-
pany to St. Louis, had in view the
building of another bridge over the
Mississippi for the use of the Penn-
sylvania Company, Baltimore &
Ohio, Chicago & Alton, and Indian-
apolis & St. Louis roads.

Gardening With Covered Soil.

Some interesting experiments
have been made in one of the pub-
lic gardens in France, in what may
be termed excessive mulching—that
is covering the soil with some ma-
terial, to completely prevent evapora-
tion. Ordinary mulching with
straw, chips, small stones, and
other materials, is often used with
a view to keep down weeds and pre-
serve the moisture of the soil, and is
largely practiced in strawberry cul-
ture. In Europe tiles have long been
employed for strawberry beds.

These tiles are in pairs, with a semi-
circular piece cut from one side of
each; when put together they sur-
round the plant completely, and the
bed is paved with tiles which have
circular openings for the plants. We
had heard of some experiments in
this country with boards similarly
arranged, which are reported to have
been successful. Many years ago
we passed a few hours at Key West,
Fla., and noticed that the most flour-
ishing of the small flower gardens
were wonderfully clean. An exami-
nation showed that the whole sur-
face of the gardens or front yards
was covered with a layer of material
or cement of some kind, perhaps
three inches thick, leaving, of course,
sufficient openings around each
plant, etc. Here were roses and
other flowering shrubs in great per-
fection under a tropical sun, while
the "soil" was swept as clean as a
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
