THE NEW BRITISH PARLIAMENT.—The present English House of Commons, the first chosen wholly by ballot, is composed as follows—139 lawyers, 129 country squires, 100 merchants, 95 army men, 24 bankers, 12 navy men, 17 brewers, 9 newspaper proprietors, 8 engineers, 6 diplomats, 6 doctors, 4 University professors, 3 farmers, 2 miners, 1 dissenting minister, and one accountant.

As compared with the last Parliament there has been an addition by the ballot of ten lawyers, twenty squires, two merchants, six bankers, three naval officers, nine brewers, two newspaper proprietors, one farmer, and two miners.

The British Mission.—In the company of emigrant Saints which arrived in this City last week, were 91 from the Swiss and German mission, 10 from the Holland mission, 11 from Iceland and the remainder from the British Isles.

Says the M. Unionist Star of June 16—

The next company will leave Liverpool on the 24th of this month, the fare to Ogden being the same as that of the present company—namely, adults, £12 16—children, under twelve years, at half fare, and infants, under 1 year, 10 shillings each, with the benefit of any reduction that there might be at the time of booking the passengers.

"It is impossible to say how long these low prices across the sea will continue; but, undoubtedly, the breach—which has caused the reduction from six guineas to three pounds, from Liverpool to New York—if not restored, will, as far as possible, be repaired by the shipping companies interested, as soon as they can effect that object."

"The fourth, and probably the last company for this season will sail from Liverpool, all being well, on the 2nd of September, allowing ample time for the Saints to reach their destination before the October Conference and to prepare for the winter; at the same time avoiding the necessity of passing through the States during any part of the two hottest months of the year."

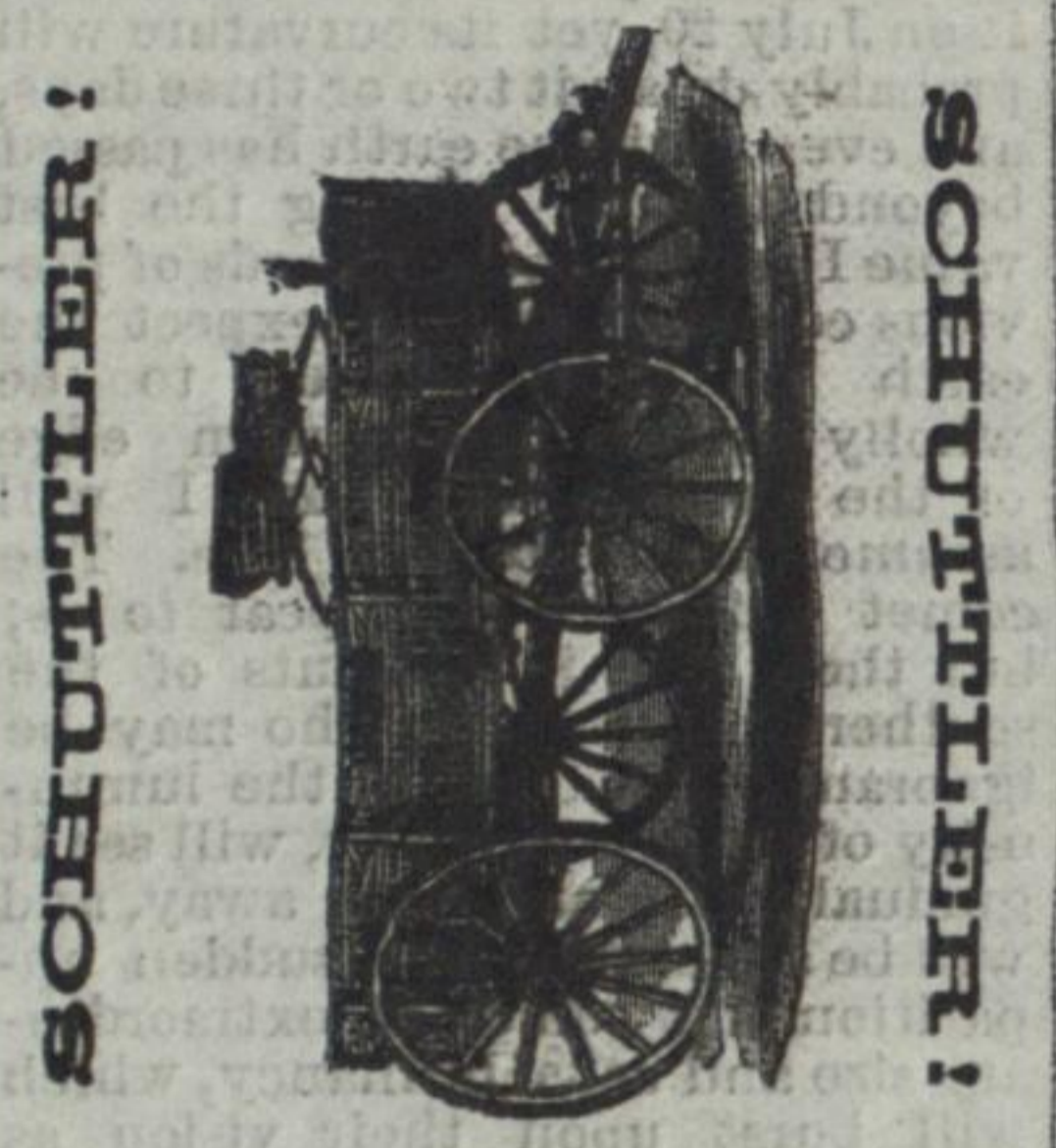
