"Most of us preachers come of hum-ble beginnings." These epigrams from a "fledgling see-

retary," as he termed himself, caused the general assembly of the Presbytertan church, as one prominent divine said, "to sit up and take notice" today. The speaker was Dr. Joseph W. Coch-ran, secretary of the Presbyterian

board of education. Dr. Cochran, who is from Philadel-phia, spoke in the afternoon on the reort of the board of education, which plored in unmistakable terms the of recruits to the ministry. The report was read by Dr. Edgar P. Hill of Chicago, who stirred the assembly to high pitch by his word picture of the norance among immigrants, due he ad, to the fact that no Protestant demomination, and surely not the Presbyterian, has taken the trouble to stir up a sufficient number of ministerial re-cruits to work among these people. The demand for more ministers was then taken up by Dr. Cochran.

"Why can't we get the young men to preach?" asked he. "I'll tell you: In the first place there is but little Christianity in the home. If there is any, if is gone by the time the young man is ready for an education. Does he go for his education to a Christian schoola Presbyterian school? No. he goes to a godless state university, and when he returns to his home town ne puts to ligion at low ebb. And if you ministers find your church is at low ebb, you find your church is at low ebb, you know where to place the blame. This young man has been educated where there is no Christianity.

work and in connection with the The report of the special committee on administrative agencies brought on a hot debate in the afternoon. The report, as read by Dr. J. D. Moffat of Pittsburg college, recommended that the various boards of the church seek legal advice for the purpose of ascer-legal advice for the purpose of ascer-taining the possibilities of enlargement of administrative powers with a view toward the consolidation with other boards. Dr. Moffat pointed out that under the laws of New York non-stock-bolding connections. holding corporations are prohibited from owning property in excess of \$3,-500,000, and that in case of a bequest it night work to the injury of the con-solidated board should the value of property owned exceed this amount.
