LOCAL BRIEFS.

All Saints' Day—The Episcopalian church is celebrating All Saints' day today in St. Mark's and St. Paul's churches.

L. S. Hills Indisposed—Pres. L. S. Hills of the Deseret National bank is confined to his home by indisposition.

Language Circle—A modern language circle is to be started at the state university. French and German will be the languages studied.

Princess Rink Opens—Over 400 people attended last night's opening of the Princess Rink, which is the state fair grounds. There was music by an orchestra.

Church Halloween—There will be a special Halloween celebration at Phillips' Congregational church this evening with a program of games and contests suitable to the occasion.

Harvest Entertainment—On Friday evening, Nov. 1, at 8 o'clock, at the Utahian hall, 142 South Second East street, a Harvest Entertainment school will give their annual "Harvest Entertainment," consisting of a short program of musical numbers to conclude with a social dance and refreshments.

Inmates Try New Escape—The inmates of the state mental hospital at Provo were put through a fire escape drill before the board of insanity at Provo yesterday. The new circular fire escape, which was completed recently and the test of yesterday shows that the building might be emptied in a few moments, should necessity arise.

Signal Corps Hop—The signal corps gave a well-attended hop last night in the state armory. It was a "Farmers' hop" in which many of the dancers appeared attired in overalls and called "The Decoration." There were also games, including pumpkins, with a good supply of cider, and the programs were printed on paper sacks. The evening was much enjoyed.

State May Select Land—The local land office has received notification of action by the interior department on the applications to select lands made by the state of Utah, and that the same had been passed by the board of entry, as follows: The unsurveyed part of township 1 north, range 13 west, township 2 north, ranges 13 and 14 west, Salt Lake meridian.

Installation Tomorrow—At tomorrow evening's installation service in the Westminster Presbyterian church the prayer will be offered by Pres. Stevenson of Westminster college, the sermon will be preached by Rev. H. E. Hayes of the Third church, the charge to the people will be given by Rev. Dr. R. G. McNeice, and the charge to the pastor by Rev. Dr. W. M. Faden. The pastor to be installed is Rev. Charles C. McIntyre, recently of Ypsilanti, Mich.

Request to Counties—State Auditor J. A. Edwards has issued the regular annual notice to the county treasurers throughout the state requesting them to transmit their reports of money due the state with remittances. While the remittances are not past due until Nov. 15, the requests have been issued to avoid borrowing money to keep the wheels of the state's machinery in running order, and some counties have already complied with the request.

An Evening With Meakin—An evening of music, poetry, song and story will be enjoyed at the testimonial given in honor of John P. Meakin, at Pioneer state hall on Friday evening, Nov. 8. Mr. Meakin on that occasion will deliver his celebrated lecture, "Onward," while the quartet composed of Mrs. Meakin, P. M. Spencer and English will render selections. After the lecture Mr. Meakin will give dramatic readings and sing some old time character songs. F. H. Meakin will act as accompanist.

Civil Service Exams—There will be civil service examinations at the Federal building in this city, Nov. 27, next for the position of typewriter and stenographer. The examination will be held at 10 o'clock. Applicants who possess a technical training, who have had a fair amount of excellent experience in surveying work and plotting, and who are capable draughtsmen will be eligible, but preference, other things being equal, will be given to those who have had experience in cartographic work.

Mrs. Ned Boyle Vividly Describes Event to Salt Lake Friend.

In a letter to a Salt Lake friend, Mrs. Ned Boyle vividly and interestingly describes the alighting of the prize winning balloon in the recent international aerial contest. It was the Pommern, owned and manipulated by Germans, which, after traveling 80 miles, came down near Axonville, Germany, where Mrs. Boyle's letter is dated. Mrs. Boyle's communication reads in part as follows: "Imagine the excitement in this household when one of our little girls came sailing along and alighted about a quarter of a mile from our place. We did not have the automobile at the door or we might have had the good fortune to see the man as they actually reached Mother Earth, but we were able to get there pretty soon. The balloon was like a huge mustard plaster (it is that color) on the short bushes in a vacant field. It would have been possible for them to have gone about 5,000 yards further, but they were afraid of being blown into the sea. The man hanging underneath it was taking them directly there."
