INTERIOR GLIMPSES OF SALT LAKE HOMES.

IN THE RESIDENCE OF FRANKLIN J. HEWLETT.

The "News" today presents this reproduction of a photograph, showing a portion of the interior of Mr. Franklin J. Hewlett's residence, at the corner of Seventh South and Second East streets. This residence is one of Salt Lake's handsome homes and attracts the attention of all who pass. From the porch, which adorns the front of the residence, the front door opens into a reception hall 13x15 feet, finished in paneled oak, and from which leads a fine stairway of the same historic wood. Light is admitted here through crescent-shaped windows fitted with beveled plate glass. South of the hall is the library, also decorated with crescent workings in Oriental style. Oak in its natural finish is the predominating feature of the parlor, while the colorings throughout are of olive green, red and gold. Openings from the parlor lead to the sitting room, the dining room and the conservatory, and by means of three sets of folding doors these four rooms may be converted into one large apartment having a length of sixty feet. Upstairs are three bedrooms, with closets, sets of drawers and bath rooms in convenient juxtaposition, all the wood construction here being of natural cedar without paint, stain or polish. Heating is by hot air and lighting is by electricity, and every detail of the structure has been planned for comfort and elegance.

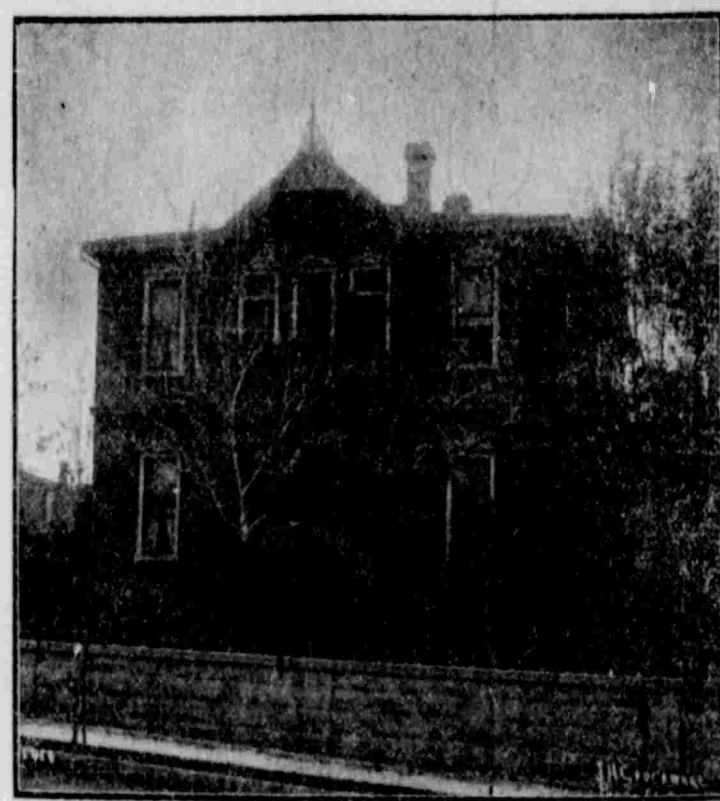

BEAUTIFUL OGDEN HOMES.



RESIDENCE OF HON. FRED J. KIESEL.

This photograph is of the elegant residence owned by Hon. Fred J. Kiesel, one of the leading wholesale merchants of the State. It is one of the finest residences in Ogden and is situated impressively on an elevation about eight feet above the sidewalk. Around the grounds is a grey sand stone wall. The house is a type of the Swiss Chalet style of architecture and is built of pressed brick with red sand stone trimmings. It was erected twenty-two years ago by Mr. Kiesel, but is still one of the most comfortable and home-like residences in Ogden. The interior of the house is most conveniently arranged. Besides twelve rooms and a bath room there are china, linen and clothes closets. On the first floor there is a large, hospitable hall which runs through the house and on either side of which are three rooms. The parlor, sitting room and a bedroom are on the right of the hall and on the left are the library, which contains a magnificent collection of books, the dining room, kitchen, china closet and bath room. The upper floor, with the same arrangement as the lower one, is devoted to bed rooms. The basement is a model. Here are cellars, coal bins and furnace rooms fitted up with hot air heating equipment. The grounds are well kept and are handsome.
