## BY TELEGRAPH.

### EUROPEAN.

Charles Sumner arrived at Liverpool on Saturday. On visiting the American club he received the first information of his nomination, by the Democrats and Liberal Republicans of Massachusetts, for governor. Sumner announces that he will positively decline.

The London journals rejoice over the conclusion of the Alabama claims controversy, and express hopes that the foundation is laid for a permanent good understanding between the two nations. The Standard, however, thinks the Tribunal should have awarded damage only for the depredations of the Alabama.

MADRID, 16.—Amadeus, in his speech at the opening of the Cortes, declared that the government was determined to subdue the rebellion in Cuba, and would send there all the additional troops necessary to end the war.

LONDON, 16.—As Prince Arthur is soon to visit Birmingham, the authorities have made an unusual appropriation for the expenses of his reception. The republican club of that city, at a recent meeting, protested against the increase of local rates for such a purpose, declaring that illuminations and banquets at public expense on these occasions was no longer in accordance with the spirit of the age.

LONDON, 17.—A special says the representatives of the Cuban Junta are in council, arranging for a loan of \$20,000,000, for the purchase of army supplies.

VIENNA, 17.—The Austrian Reichsrath opened yesterday. In the opening address the President took occasion to refer to the recent conference of emperors at Berlin, and said the understanding there arrived at was a certain guarantee of the peace of Europe for some years to come.

LONDON, 17.—The Tory journals are bitter over the result of the Geneva arbitration.

It is reported that the Princess Beatrice is betrothed to the Marquis of Stafford. The Princess is in her sixteenth year, and the Marquis in his twenty-second.

London, 18.—A dispatch from Tehoyn, reports that cholera is raging with great violence at Bokhara. It is estimated that a thousand persons are dying daily from the scourge.

BERLIN, 18.—Correspondence between the Emperor William, Bismarck and Bishop Ermaland, on the subject of excommunication, is published. The bishop takes decided ground against the interference of the secular authorities in matters of religion. The tone of the communications on both sides is sharp and uncompromising.

The government has issued a second circular, in still more threatening terms than the original one, against emi-

grants, who, it declares, will be treated as outlaws, over whom special vigilance has been instituted. Despite the menaces of the government, emigration has been only slightly affected.

LONDON, 18.—Thomas Hughes attempted last night to address his constituents at Frome, but the temperance men, who are bitterly opposed to Hughes, created such disturbance that the police cleared the hall.

Acts of petty incendiarism in the agricultural districts have become so frequent that the farmers are organizing vigilance committees, the local authorities being unable to check the growing evil.

LONDON, 19.—A Stockholm dispatch announces the death of King Charles of Sweden, at Malmo, last evening.

LONDON, 20.—The mine owners of Newcastle, in their reply to the demands of the deputation from the Miner's Association, refused the advance of fifteen per cent. in wages on the ground that the price of coal had already fallen and a further considerable decline was expected.

London telegrams of the 19th say that tumult, discord, and dissension, if not disorganization have been characteristic features of the continued session of the International congress. Six of the foremost members, including Prest. Ravviere, have seceded from the conclave in despair, finding that the international politics of the working classes, to which their efforts and most of the discussion have been directed, were so unpromising. They were also adverse to the transfer of the general council to America. Among the curious results of the meeting is the dispatch of a letter to the three emperors at Berlin, in which the conclave expresses its hope that the conference of the sovereigns will have a result favorable to the durable maintenance of peace and a pacific solution of the social question.

Diplomatic notes have been exchanged between France and Germany concerning the arrest of Edmond About. The charge on which he is about to be tried consists of two counts—one accuses him of publishing hostile articles in German territory in October, 1871; the other, of circulating the same in the province of Lorraine. About sends word from his prison to Thiers, entreating him to be calm and take no step in the case which would imperil France.

PARIS, 21.—Gambetta has left for St. Etienne, the public banquet in celebration of the anniversary of the first Republic to-morrow, at which he was to speak, having been prohibited.

It is reported an engagement has taken place, at Cubidas, in which 300 were killed and wounded.

VIENNA, 21.—By imperial decree the Austrian court will wear mourning for twelve days in respect to the memory of the deceased King of Sweden.

LONDON, 21.—The meeting of the members of the League of St. Sebastian at Dublin, yesterday, took the formation of an organization to afford material aid in restoring the temporal power of the Pope.

Sir John Duke Coleridge and other distinguished jurists are advocating, in the newspapers, the codification or digest of the English laws, similar to the code of New York, which they praise highly.

The Labor League, yesterday, adopted resolutions approving the award of the Geneva Tribunal, as binding England and America together, and promoting the advancement of industry and civilization.

LONDON, 22.—The government of Brazil has granted to Baron Monca a concession for a telegraphic cable between Brazil and the Portuguese coast.

BERLIN.—It is stated that the Emperor contemplates a large reduction of the army occupying French territory, after the payment of the second war indemnity.

LONDON, 23.—Snow fell at Sheffield yesterday.

LONDON, 19.—John Fox & Co., merchants, Mining Lane, have suspended. Liabilities half a million pounds. They have connections with several American houses. The suspension was caused by the recent failures at Baltimore.

LONDON, 19.—Sir Wilfred Lawson, Liberal member of Parliament for Carlisle, while addressing a meeting in Cumberland last night, warmly praised the conduct of Disraeli during the Alabama claims controversy, and said he rejoiced over the settlement of the differences between England and America without recourse to the sword.

The wife of Bismarck has arrived at Torquay, where she will soon be rejoined by her husband.

The bark City of Hamilton, from London for Philadelphia, put into Ryde, Isle of Wight, in consequence of a mutiny among the crew.

The congress of the Internationalists closed its session to-day. Previous to adjournment a resolution was passed, condemning the proceedings of the recent congress at the Hague as creating a disruption in the order.

LONDON, 20.—Prince Arthur opened Roundhay Park, Leeds, yesterday, with appropriate ceremonies, in the presence of a large assembly. A ball was given at the Town Hall in the evening.

During a thunder storm yesterday, the lightning struck a mill in Littleborough, Lancashire, and killed four women. Several other operatives were injured.

DUBLIN, 19.—The meeting to protest against the occupation of Rome, which was advertised some days ago, has been indefinitely postponed for some unexplained cause.

ROME.—The eldest brother of the Pope is dead.

BERLIN, 20.—A congress of the old Catholics convened at Cologne yesterday; much enthusiasm was manifested by the delegates, who numbered three hundred.

BERLIN, 20.—During the recent meeting of the Emperor the subject of the inviolability of property at sea in time of war was considered by Prince Gortschakoff, Count Andrassy and Prince Bismarck. It was regarded as a good omen for the final establishment of this principle that the governments of the United States, Austria, Germany, Russia, Italy, and Holland were united in its support.

A writer in the London News, having published a graphic description of the horrors of a steerage passage across the Atlantic, scores of correspondents are adding their testimony as to the abuses and sufferings to which steerage passengers are subjected, and demanding immediate reform.
