

MARRIAGE OF MURIEL WHITE

Arrangements, Which Were Delayed by Certain Religious Difficulties, Completed.

CARDINAL KOPP OBDURATE.

Would Not Grant Dispensation Unless Groom Refrained from Other Religious Ceremony.

Paris, April 20.—The arrangements for the wedding of Count Hermann Scherzinger and Miss Muriel White, daughter of Ambassador White, which was delayed by certain religious difficulties arising through differences in the faith of the contracting parties, are now completed. The civil ceremony, which alone constitutes a legal marriage in France, was performed April 20 by the mayor of the eighth arrondissement in which the ambassador resides. The following day the religious marriage will be celebrated at St. Joseph's church, one of the most exclusive Catholic churches in Paris.

Miss White retains her Protestant faith, but her family strongly desire that both Protestant and Catholic religious services should follow the civil marriage, and the groom's father and family were in full sympathy with this. Cardinal Kopp, bishop of Breslau, the dispenser of the dispensation, however, declined, however, to grant a dispensation for the marriage except on condition that the groom refrain from any religious ceremony, and with the usual restrictions concerning the faith of any issue of the marriage.

Difficulties were brought to bear in an endeavor to induce Cardinal Kopp to concede the service of the Episcopal church, but these failed. As the cardinal remained obdurate, however, Ambassador White finally acquiesced, but as a protest against the attitude of his religious authorities, he decided to abstain from attending the Catholic ceremony.

FATHER'S STATEMENT.

With regard to his decision, he says: "With my public and private life dominated by my freedom from religious ties, but under the circumstances and as the representative of a country eminent for its religious tolerance, although predominantly Protestant, I have decided not to attend the service at St. Joseph's, the more so as there are several recent precedents for a Catholic ceremony and one of another denomination."

Miss White's niece, Miss Margaret Rutherford, the daughter of Mrs. W. K. Vandewater, and Miss Lucy Rankin, the daughter of Ambassador White's sister, William H. Rankin, secretary of the American legation at Madrid, will act as bridesmaids.

The marriage contract, which was signed at the German consulate, stipulates that the couple shall live under what is known in Europe as the "régime of separation of property." This contract contains no dowry provision.

After the wedding trip the count and countess will go to Breslau, where the count is stationed at present.

GOT A LIFE JOB.

New York, April 21.—John J. Williams, an employee of a machine company, has been awarded a life pension court to pay a judgment of \$14,000 with interest from May 3, 1904 at the rate of 5% a week. Williams is 60 years old. It would require more than 120 years for him to pay up at the rate prescribed, while Mrs. J. C. Fisk, to whom he must pay the money, would have passed the century mark.

Mrs. Fisk's husband and Williams were partners in the brokerage business 25 years ago. They had a dispute over funds and Fisk brought suit and obtained a judgment which was never paid. Later his wife pushed the case.

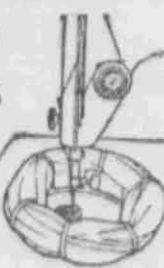

APPEAL TO SENATE FOR CHEAPER PAPER

Associated Press Adopts Resolution Asking Senators to Read Report of Select Committee.

New York, April 20.—At the annual meeting of the Associated Press here today the following directors were elected to succeed themselves:

Thomas G. Rapier, New Orleans; Henry Victor F. Lawson, Chicago; Daily News; Herman Ridder, New York; State Zeitung; Harvey W. Scott, Portland Oregonian; and Gen. Charles H. Taylor, Boston Globe.

Rufus N. Rhodes of the Birmingham (Ala.) News, was elected to fill a vacancy caused by the resignation of George Thompson of the St. Paul Dispatch.

The following resolution was adopted: "Whereas, A committee of Congress of which J. S. Mann of Illinois is chairman, has spent nearly a year painstakingly investigating the question of the news print paper supply and has reported unanimously to Congress in favor of abolishing all tariff on ground wood and reducing the tax on news print paper from 8¢ to 4¢ per ton, and, whereas, The same report was unanimously accepted by the ways and means committee of the house of representatives and duly passed as part of the new tariff bill now pending in the United States senate, the members of the Associated Press at their annual meeting hereby:

"Resolve: That we respectfully request the members of the senate of the United States to carefully read the report of the select committee with the view of convicting themselves of the justice of its recommendations to the senate and that a permanent supply of news print paper be secured to the printing and publishing industry, which is the seventh greatest in the United States."

"We further ask the members of the senate to consider that this is not a partisan move, but represents the unanimous view of both sides in the select committee and the ways and means committee and is the result of careful and deliberate judgment exercised only after a thorough inquiry. The newspaper believes they are entitled to have the conclusions of this committee respected and written in the law."

"Resolved, That a copy of the above be transmitted immediately to every United States senator."

New York, April 21.—The "sleeper" trunk smuggling cases which have occupied the attention of customs officers here for some time past will be taken up by the grand jury today or tomorrow. There is a rumor that a prominent mercantile firm is involved, and interesting developments are expected. United States Dist. Atty. Wise after conferring with treasury officials in Washington about the case returns to New York this morning and will go before the grand jury. No further action has been made to stop prosecution since Collector Loeb refused to consider the tender of \$200,000.

REMARKABLE CURE OF MALIGNANT TUMOR

New York, April 21.—Surgeons at the Flower hospital have just effected a remarkable cure of a patient suffering with a malignant tumor by means of the injection of gelatin impregnated with radium. Only one other similar case is on record, according to the hospital authorities, and was treated in Europe recently by means of radium in a glass tube, which was sewed up in the tumor.

In the Flower hospital case the tumor came as large as a grape fruit and was first reduced by use of the x-ray. Then the radio-active gelatin was injected and at the end of five weeks the growth was so materially reduced that the patient was allowed to go home. It is expected that he will recover completely, although the tumor was in the abdomen and his death was expected six months ago. No official report has been made on the case nor has the name of the patient been made public. He is a resident of Westchester county and went to the hospital with the idea of an operation. The history of the case will be published in the official journal of the New York Homeopathic college in a short time.

The report was completed yesterday and shows that the figures are far in excess of last year. The following is a comparative statement:
