#### Strongly of the Opinion That a **Purely Defensive One Would Be Almost Worthless**

ITS FUNCTION IS TO DESTROY

#### Without Island Possessions Need for An Aggressive Naval Policy Would Still be Present.

Newport, R. I., July 22.-President Roosevelt after an adventurous night trip in the fog from Oyster Bay, during which his yacht, the Mayflower, ran down and sank a jumber schooner, rescuing the crew of six men on board, arrived here at 9:45 a. m. today and later at the naval war college ad-dressed a conference of nearly 100 naval officers representing all branches of the service, to consider plains for new American battleships, President Roosevelt made a stirring appeal for a hard-hitting navy.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

In his address to the conference the

In his address to the conference the president said: "There are only a few things thit I desire to say today to the conference, and what I have to say really is said less to the officers present than to the great bulk of my fellow countrymen outside. I could not speak to you tech-nically, I can speak to my fellow coun-trymen who are deeply interested in the American navy but who sometimes tend to be misled as to the kind of navy we should have and as to what the navy ean and ought to do. "For instance, there are always cer-tain numbers of well meaning, amiable individuals coupled with others not quite so well meaning; who advocato merely a coast defense navy. Such advocacy illustrates a habit of mind as old as human mature itself-the de-sine at the same time to do something
