THEY LACKED READY CASH.

pepositors' Money Invested in Real Estate-Failure Caused But Little Excitement.

Peoria, Ill., Nov. 30 .- Three banking institutions in McDonough county, conducied by C. V. Chandler of Macomb closed their doors today. Notices to the effect that the banks were short of ready cash were posted on the doors of at the banks. This decision was mached yesterday on an examination of the books by Mr. Chandler himself. The banks are the Bank of Macomb, conducted by C. V. Chandler & Co., deposits of \$450,000 and capitalized at \$50,-60; the Chandler & Imes bank at Colchester, capitalized at \$25,000 and deposits of \$200,000, and the Chandler & smith bank of Bardolph, capitalized at 13,000, with \$60,000 deposits.

The money of the depositors in all three banks has been invested theough Mr. Chandler, the senior member of the private banking firms, in McDonough county real estate, and the immediate cause of the suspension of the three incause of the suspension of the three in-situtions is given as a lack of ready each. The Macomb bank guarantees its payment of the bonds of the Ma-oone & Western Illinois Electric rail-way, and when the bondholders made a demand for their money they absorbed at the seedy each of the three instituil the ready cash of the three institu-

IDAHO TIMBER DEAL.

Spokane, Wash., Nov. 30.—It is an-nounced that over 100.000 acres of tim-ber land, on which is approximately 2.-500,000,000 feet of standing timber valued at \$500,000, has been purchased by the Monarch Timber company, in the St Joe and St. Marie's river valleys in Ida-be

ho. Half of this gigantic purchase was made in a single deal between A. W. Flewelling of Spokane, representing the Monarch Timber company, and F. A. Blackwell of Coeur d'Alene, Ida., rep-resenting his own interests and the William Howard Land & Timber com-pany. This is said to be the largest single timber land deal ever negotiated on the Pacific coast.
