

WILL HOLD REUNION AT LAGOON AUG. 14

"Pacific Islanders Day" Promises
To be One of Most Enjoy-
able in History.

RARE PROGRAM PREPARED.

Lectures on Life on the Islands to be
Delivered by Returned
Missionaries.

The first Sunday in August has al-
most grown to be known as "Pacific
Islanders day" in the various wards of
the Church, but more especially in the
wards contiguous to the railroad from
Richfield on the south to Preston,
Idaho, on the north.

In order to keep alive the interest

of returned missionaries in Pacific Is-
land subjects the general committee
of the Pacific island missionaries in-
augurated a lecture bureau some two or
three years ago. This bureau works
in connection with Mutual Improvement
association presidents and arranges as
much as possible to give Pacific island
lectures at the joint meetings of the
association the first Sunday in August
of each year. Last year lectures
were given upon Pacific Island sub-
jects in a number of wards extending
from Richfield to Preston, but this year
even greater interest than ever before
is being taken by the people and by
missionaries themselves. Some 34 lec-
tures will be given in Salt Lake and
Davis counties alone this year. Sub-
committees, both north and south, take
an active interest along the same lines
as the general committee, furnishing
lectures to all associations which may
desire to hear of the unique people
inhabiting the islands of the Pacific.

ANNUAL REUNION.

Closely following the date of these
lectures the missionaries hold their
annual reunion and for one day ex-
perience again the life they had while
laboring among the natives of the
islands. Practically every missionary
of these islands has spent from three
to five years in the work among the
natives so that to shake the hands of
their old companions, and sing again
the native songs is to them an annual
treat that few care to miss.

The programs prepared for this fes-
tival day are both very interesting and
entertaining to those who have not
had the pleasure of visiting any of
the islands and especially so since the

addition of Japan to the Pacific Is-
lands mission.

THE PROGRAM.

cific Islanders' day at Lagoon Aug. 14,
1907:

Song and dance. Hawaiian natives

verse, English; first verse, Tahitian;

Samoan; fourth verse, Maori; "Joseph
Smith's First Prayer," Japanese.

Japanese sword contest, prize \$5;
Japanese Jiu Jitsu, prize \$5, H. S.
Ensign, supervisor.
Foot race, first prize, \$3, second
prize, \$2, Mathew Noali, supervisor.
Native sham battle, Tahiti and Sa-
moa, vs. New Zealand and Hawaii,
H. S. Cutler, supervisor.
Synopsis of native sham battle: Ab-
duction of native woman from village.
Failure of negotiations for her return.
Engagement in battle, restoration
and reconciliation.
Baseball, New Zealand and Samoa
vs. Tahiti and Hawaii, H. K. Aldous,
supervisor. Baseball game com-
mences at 11 a. m.
Japanese Sumo, national song and

name to the respective supervisors.
Shields and all equipments of war
for the sham battle will be provided
by the general committee.

The native sham battle in which 40
returned missionaries take part and
the Japanese numbers are the distinc-
tive features this year. It takes 20
Japanese to give an exhibition of
"Sumo" and five to give the national
song and dance. Native Japanese
from the sugar beet fields near Gar-
land are now practicing for these
events.

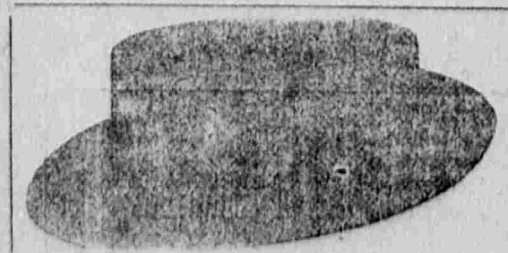
