

duce a bill for the purchase by the Government of the London Water Company's works.

At the inquiry into the Tay bridge disaster on Saturday, several moulders employed by the contractors of the bridge testified that the quality of iron used for the castings was very inferior; that the columns were frequently defective, of unequal thickness, cracked and scabbed, and that cracks and holes were filled with putty and cement and painted over.

Intelligence has been received from Bombay that the steamer from Vingorla bound to Kurrachee foundered and five Europeans and 59 natives were lost.

General Von Kameke, German Minister of War, introduced the army bill in the Reichstag to-day and pointed out that the federal government could not leave to chance the question of being outstripped by neighboring powers, and that it was necessary to place the military institutions of Germany on a par with those of her neighbors, although it could not be said that reasons of an acute character impelled the government to bring forward the bill.

Count de Saint Vollier, French ambassador at Berlin, gave a dinner at the Embassy to-night, which was attended by the Emperor and Empress of Germany, Prince Bismarck, the principal court dignitaries, Prince Hohenlohe, Count Stallberg Winzingerode and Generals Von Der Goltz and Von Lehendorff.

Victor Hugo has published an appeal to the government not to surrender Hartmann to the Russian authorities. Several Russians have waited on Gambetta to solicit his influence with the government to prevent the extradition of Hartmann.

A Russian has been arrested at Didenhofen, Alsace, who the police declare they can prove has asserted connection with the Moscow explosion, and his intention to make another attempt on the life of the Czar.

The ceremonies on the occasion of the 25th anniversary of the Czar's accession to the throne will be very limited. A full dress reception at noon followed by a celebration of mass, and military serenade in the evening. All the generals and officers will assemble at half-past nine in the open space fronting the Winter Palace and the Admiralty, with detachments of soldiers and various branches of service bands of all the regiments now here, uniting with singers from several divisions of the guards and 300 drummers will all form in a semi-circle before the Palace. During the singing of the National Anthem a salute of 101 guns will be fired on the opposite bank of the Neva.

General Stewart's advance upon Guzni will probably commence between the 20th and 31st of March. A son of the Khan of Bokhara is reported at Jelallabad on his way to Peshawar with 140 followers. He is probably the same prince who has been living for some time a refugee in Cabul.

A Constantinople dispatch says: M. Onou, Chief Dragoman of the Russian embassy, and Col. Conaroff were fired at to-day by two persons, who subsequently succeeded in making their escape. Col. Conaroff was wounded, Onou was not hurt.
