

# SALT LAKE WON IN THE LAST INNING.

Got Even With the Park City Team in the Mining Camp Yesterday.

## VICTORY CAME IN THE NINTH

And the Final Score Was Ten to Nine  
—Locals Will Play Eureka  
Next Sunday.

The Salt Lake baseball team got even with the Park City team on the latter's home grounds yesterday, and defeated the Miners by a score of 10 to 9. The game was won in the last inning of a hard-fought game, full of interest and thrills that makes the fan's heart glad.

Castleton was in the box for the rejuvenated Salt Lake aggregation, while Fulmer delivered the twists for the gold diggers.

There were plenty of hits, plenty of errors and many runs in the game, but the well worth looking at for all that Castleton was touched up for a total of 14 hits while Fulmer was hit 15. In the first three innings the miners were only able to score one run, but added another during Fulmer's bid for a tie. The twelfth then settled down and ended the game pretty well throughout the balance of the contest. Thornton was apparently the only man who had solved the delivery to any great extent, but it was a toss of the coin where game it was. Jack Thornton, also assisted by a lot of foul balls, gave the Park City fans a rather interesting show of his hitting ability.

## THE GREAT FUTURITY

Was Run at Sheephead and Was Captured by Ormondale.

A Saturday dispute from New York gave the following account of the great Futurity at Sheephead Bay.

Ormondale, a red colt, blood of the turf, descendant of a line of aristocratic equine ancestors extending back nearly a century, was the trial star of the eighteenth running Futurity stakes for 2-year-olds at Sheephead Bay today.

Playoffs in the meeting at 5 to 6 with jockeys of the two in the race, the top bill, Ormondale perfectly ridden by him, won with half a length to spare.

The time was fast 114 1/2, equaling the record of the day. At the Putney meeting, the colors of Harry Payne Whitney, was whipped into second place by White, while Belmore, in the Kilkenny entry, ran third.

The winner ran in the name and colors of the Ormondale stable, a racing partnership composed of W. O. McDonald, of New York, one of the stewards of the New York, and Mr. Donald, a member of New York, and Mr. Ormondale, who is a son of the racing tycoon.

The winner, however, was no people, but was by means a record-breaker. The weather was perfect, the rain of yesterday had left having the forenoon been warm and sunshiny.

The track was almost up to record quality when the Futurity candidates were placed in the paddock at 1 o'clock.

The Futurity scratches, breeders' and owners' riders, were all mounted on all parts of the country.

The race ran up the six furlongs in 114 1/2, a half a second faster than the record set by the great old timer, the Ormondale colt, guided by Redfern's steady hands.

To a fair start the seventeen 2-year-olds left the paddock in one great swooping group. From the grandstand it was half a dozen or more seconds to the half-mile, the great Ormondale.

He had the lead in the stretch, but Redfern riding a strong finish with hands and knees sent Ormondale over the wire with a good half-length.

The Futurity purse this year amounted to a total of \$26,000, several thousand of which early money.

The winner, however, was the sum of \$1,000, which was awarded to Fred Lewis, owner of the colt.
