

ashore with a line and was dashed against the rocks and drowned. Another seaman was successful in reaching the shore with the line. The remainder of the crew were saved. The men suffered terribly during the cold and stormy night. The storm at Canso last night was very severe. Many vessels dragged their anchors; some went ashore.

WASHINGTON, 12.—The following is a list of the items approved by the committee: Glue 20 per centum ad valorem; beeswax 20 ad valorem; gelatine and all similar preparations 30 ad valorem; soap, hard and soft, all of which not otherwise specifically enumerated and provided for in this act, and Castile soap, two cents per pound; fancy, perfumed and all descriptions of toilet soaps, 15 cents a pound; sponges, 20 per cent. ad valorem. Acids—acetic, acetic or pyrologous, not exceeding the specific gravity of 1.047, two cents per pound; exceeding that specific, 10 cents per pound; citric, tartaric, 10 cents per pound; camphor, refined, five cents per pound; castor oil, 50 cents a gallon; cream tartar, six cents a pound; dextrose, burnt starch, gum substitute or British gum, 10 per centum ad valorem; Indigo extracts and carmines, 10 per centum ad valorem; iodine, sublimed, 40 cents per pound; licorice, paste or roll, six cents per pound; licorice juice, three cents per pound; oil of bay leaves, essential, or bay rum essence or oil, \$2.50 per pound; croton oil 50 cents per pound; hemp seed and rape seed oil, 10 cents a gallon; strychnine or strychnine, and all salts thereof 50 cents per ounce; tartar, partly refined, including Lee's crystals, 50 cents per pound; acidulated phosphate for lime ammoniated or otherwise, \$3, a ton; alumina, alum, patent alum, alums substitute, sulphate of alumina and aluminous cake, and alum in crystals or ground 60 cents per hundred pounds ammonia, liquified by pressure, 20 per centum ad valorem; water of ammonia 20 ad valorem; sal ammoniac, 10 per cent ad valorem; carbonate of, 20 ad valorem; sulphate of, 20 ad valorem in imitation of natural mineral waters and artificial mineral waters, 30 ad valorem; asbestos, manufactured, 20 ad valorem; baryta, sulphate of, or barytes, unmanufactured, 10 ad valorem; manufactured, 20 ad valorem; refined borax, 8 cents per pound; cement, 25 ad valorem. The committee disapproved the Commission's change of the tariff rate on flax seed and linseed oil, which was put at 25 cents per gallon, and restored it to the old rate of 39 cents. The following items were passed for consideration: Glycerine, crude and refined; phosphorus, castor beans, soda and potash, tartrate or Rochelle salts. The committee considered about two-thirds of the items of schedule "A." They resume work to-morrow.

#### FOREIGN.

LONDON, 11.—Lord Houghton had bronchitis, not paralysis.

Paris, 11.—Wm. Galligani, last of the well known family is dead.

It is reported from Saigon that 10,000 Chinese have crossed the Tonquin frontier.

The Senate voted 100,000 francs for the relief of the sufferers by the floods in the Seine district.

Paris, 11.—It is stated that China is making great preparations to resist the French designs on Tonquin. The French government is consequently urged to take active measures.

Gambetta left his bed to-day.

Dublin, 11.—The full court of the land commission, on appeal, confirmed the decree of commissioner Lytton on the test case affecting 1,200 tenants on the estate of Sir John Leslie, County Monaghan. The question was concerning the interpretation of the hanging gate clause of the arrears of rent act, decided indirectly in tenants favor.

Cairo, 11.—It is expected a decree will be issued in a few days, degrading Arabi and other condemned pashas, and ordering the confiscation of their property.

Fifty-four political prisoners have been released.

Madrid, 11.—A heavy snowstorm, accompanied by gales, prevailed. A number of shipwrecks are reported.

Brussels, 11.—Testimony in the Bernay's murder case closed to-day. The American employers of Leon Peltzer say they have such faith in his innocence, they would gladly re-employ him.

Canon Bernard, charged with absconding to America with the

treasures of the diocese of Tournay, has enabled the commissary of police to obtain \$3,000 from Boston, and \$5,000 from New York of the stolen property.

Berlin, 11.—The government will oppose the bill taxing bourse transactions. Large bankers will transfer their business to foreign places if the bill becomes a law.

The Prussian delegation in the Bundesrath submitted a motion providing for an increased duty on new lumber to 15 pfennigs, and on wrought lumber to 25 pfennigs per 100 weight.

The Russian Ambassador has left for St. Petersburg in connection with efforts to induce Russia to reduce the tariff.

London, Ont., 11.—Amherstburg Crossing, on the Canada Southern Railroad, is blocked with snow and ice. An train of 26 cars of cattle are held fast in the river, and are in a deplorable condition.

Rome, 12.—The Duke of Sermonata, who was president of the provisional government after the entry of the Italian troops into Rome in 1870 is dead.

MADRID, 12.—Part of the war office was burned to the ground and 20 persons injured, one seriously. The library and part of the archives were destroyed. The king was present during the fire and assisted in subduing the flames.

London, 12.—P. M. General Fawcett had another hemorrhage last evening.

London, 10.—The steamer *Otranto*, of New York, lies off the Lizard, with her machinery disabled.

London, 11.—Exceptionally dense fogs prevailed yesterday and to-day. The traffic in the streets, on the rivers and railways, was impeded. Five persons were drowned by breaking through the ice while skating. The thermometer indicated seven degrees below the freezing point.

Pesth, 11.—A heated debate occurred in the Diet yesterday, concerning alleged abuses in connection with contracts for engineering work on the river Theiss. The president of the Hungarian council declared the opportunity should be taken to protest against the officers of the government being described as a "band of robbers."

In the high school of Dedham, Massachusetts, the experiment is being made of using daily newspapers instead of text books in the reading class. The principal thinks that the plan is successful. The pupils read better, and are more interested in their reading.

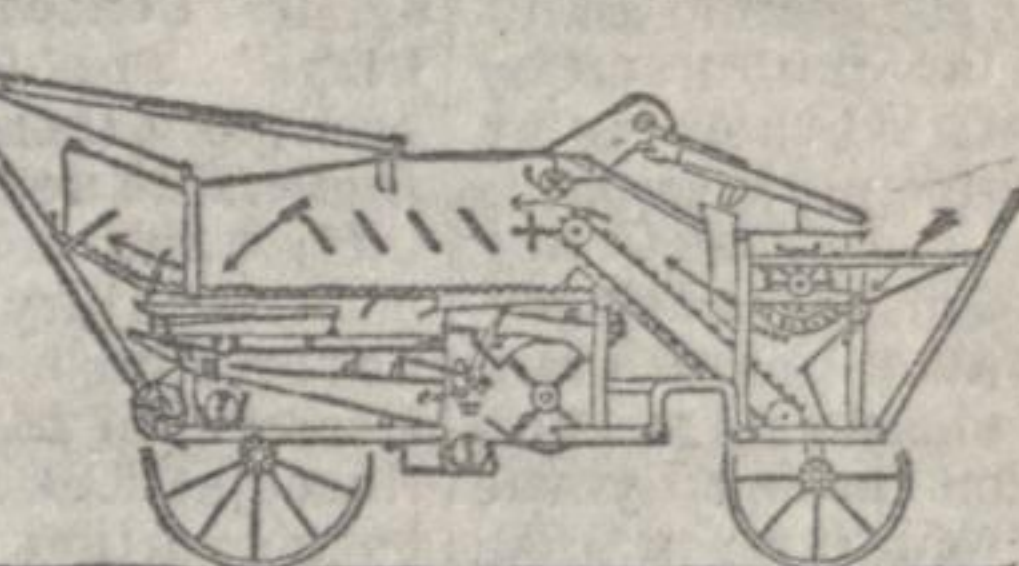
