## LIQUOR TRAFFIC ON THE GRIDDLE

License Committee of City Council Comes from Hibernial Slumber.

### CONDITIONS DEMAND REFORM

Rooming Houses, So-Called, Restaurants and Other Places of "Blind Pig" Variety Under Ban.

The license committee of the city council was the only committee to get really busy last night at the regular meeting of the various agencies, Chairman J. J. Stewart and colleagues, who look after the raising of revenues from license collections, listened to representatives of saloons relative to the vexed question as to what sum shall be taxed against the dispensers of liquors, when the privilege money shall be paid, etc.

The saloon men present before the committee were John Poole, Joe Lane, Frank Stewart and Frank Wentzel. Drug stores and rooming houses came in for considerable criticism, the charge being made that in these places liquor is being sold every day in the week, and with but little consideration being taken of the age or condition of the purchasers. Fourteen barrels of whisky were accredited as having been sold in a single week by one drug store located in the heart of the city.

The bartenders also charged that the police discriminated in the matter of Saturday night closing, requiring some saloons to close up on the dot of 12 o'clock midnight, while permitting others to remain open longer. While no decision was reached by the committee, it is likely that at least some of the following suggestions will have part in the new ordinances proposed to regulate the liquor traffic.

The abolishment of the payment of licenses by the quarter.  
All retail, and possibly wholesale, liquor licenses to be paid for the year in advance.

Drug stores, rooming houses, parlor houses, and possibly restaurants, must pay a retailer's license of \$1,200 a year in advance just as proposed by the saloons.

Holders of government licenses must pay a city liquor license of either \$400 or \$1,000 annually, in advance, and the circumstances may demand, the possession of a government license to be prima facie evidence that the holder is engaged in the liquor traffic.

No license will be given to engage in the liquor traffic in a place which has been closed for a violation of the liquor laws, for six months afterwards. Saloons, restaurants, drug stores and all other holders of liquor licenses must closely follow the Sunday closing law, so far as it relates to their respective places, under penalty of a revocation of their license, without refund for the unexpired term it has to run.

All connections, such as exits and entrances, between saloons and restaurants must be abolished.

**OCTOBER HEALTH BULLETIN.**  
The October bulletin of the state board of health shows the total of deaths from all causes was 293, to which is added 16 deaths not reported for the previous month. Districts reporting no deaths, 72; of 141 towns and districts reporting. Localities free from contagious diseases, 72; scarlet fever, 56 cases; 2 deaths; smallpox, 25 cases; 8 deaths; typhoid fever, 12 cases; 2 deaths; whooping cough, 70 cases; 2 deaths; measles, 13 cases; no deaths; chickenpox, 25 cases; no deaths; pneumonia, 71 cases; 39 deaths; consumption, 15 cases; 5 deaths. It is noticed

that the number of deaths during the past month is less than is usual at this time of year.
