Water Bonds Voted by This Margin With Sewer Bonds Following By a Smaller Lead.

With a total vote of 5,547, which, small as it is, is large for a bond election, the city fathers may now go ahead to issue bonds to the amount of \$600,000 and offer them to the highest Lidders.

The water bonds received 3,024 votes and the sewer bonds 2,937 votes, with 2,523 votes against the water bonds and 2.587 votes against the sewer bonds

This left the bonds a majority of 501 for the water, and 350 for the sewer, a number of votes equal to only a small portion of those cast at a single polling place in an ordinary election.
