RESOLUTIONS OF RESPECT

Adopted by the Ctty Council in Regular Session Last Night.

County Schools Will Hold Commentorative Exercises in Honor of President Mckinley.

The city council met in regular session last evening but out of respect for the memory of President McKinley they transacted no business but adopted the following resolutions after which they adjourned until the next regular meeting.

Whereas, the President of our Republic has been foully slain by an assassin; be it

Resolved, By the city council of Ogden City, Utah, in regular session assembled, that we deplore the terrible calamity, and bespeak for the nation the sympathies of a compassionate world

Resolved that in the person of President McKinley we recognize all the qualities that the Creator could combine to produce a perfect man, and that love and care shown by him for his invalid wife has still further inspired our love and endeared him to us.

Resolved, that we deplore his death as a family, as a state, as a national calamity. We ask God to carry comcalamity. We ask God to carry com-fort to his stricken widow, to bring light out of the darkness caused by his death and safe guidance to the people of the United States.

Resolved that we renounce all forms of anarchy and declare that our immiration laws should be so amended as to prevent as far as possible the admission of anarchists into our country. Resolved that the Constitution be s

amended as to make it treason to at-tempt the life of the President or Vice President of these the United States of America.

He was one of the most extensive property owners in Ogden and interested in so many enterprises that it would be hard to compute his wealth with greater degree of accuracy. He was a man who was devoted to his friends and his family who in turn reciprocated his affections His death will be the cause of general and sincere grief throughout Ogden and Weber county, where he has for so many years been a pillar in the finan-cial and an ornament in the social

BIOGRAPHICAL.

world.

David Harold Peery was born May 16th, 1824, at Tazewell county, Virginia. His parents were Major David Peery and Eleanor Harman Peery. His early boybood was passed in Virginia and Kentucky. His father was a well to do farmer owning lands, livestock and negroes. He finished the common schools of Virginia, and went to the Emery and Henry College, in the years 1842-43. His early manhood was passed in Virginia. in Virginia.

VOCATION.

He was naturally inclined to follow merchandising and banking. From 1822 to 1842 he worked on his father's farm when not at school. From 1844 to 1845 He commenced m taught school. the merchandising business in 1846 with his brother, John D. Peery, in Tazewell county, Virginia, and contin-ued merchandising and banking with success until 1861. ENTERS THE ARMY.

December 30th, 1852, he married Nancy

C. Higginbotham, daughter of William E. and Louise Ward Higginbotham, who were all Latter-day Saints. In 1862 he volunteered and entered the Confederate army of eastern Kentucky, as assistant commisary under Generat Humphrey Marshal. Up to 1861 he had been remarkably prosperous being out of debt and worth more than \$150,000 with a good name and character, In 1861 began a series of misfortunes and disasters in his affairs. His oldest son died May 1st, 1861. In June, 1862, while in the army, he was taken down with typhold fever and was removed in an ambulance to his father's home, and while he was sick his father and mother and father-in-law, William Higgin-botham, all died of the same disease, In July, 1862, being still sick, he was removed to his own home in Burk's Gardens. On September 30th, 1862, his wife died. She was the beloved com-panion of his joys and sor-rows. Soon thereafter his other children died with the exception of his daughter Lettle, who is now the wife of Hon, C. C. Richards of Ogden, Being still sick and much distressed in mind he became greatly in-terested in the Gospel. Reading the

Bible and the writings of I ley and Orson Pratt he came convinced of the truth Parbecame convinced of the truth of the Gospel as revealed in the lat-ter-day work of the Saints. In November 1862, he was baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saluts by a local Elder. Absolam Young, when the snow was a foot deep and the ice six inches thick. In Decem-ber, 1862, he returned to the Confeder-

ate army, acted as sutler under the command of General Williams of Kencommand of General Williams of Ken-tucky. In the spring of 1863, while in the army he was again taken down with typhold fever. During his former sick-ness he lay six weeks and during the

South Pass and arrived in Sat Lake City August 31st, 1864. He first settled Mill Creek ward, where he taught

school, and in 1865 he went to Big Cot-tonwood, where he bought Dr. Henry Lee's farm and worked the farm for two years. April 10th, 1865, he married Letitia Higginbotham, the sister of his former wife, and who is now living. In October, 1866, he moved to Ogden. On reaching that city he ran a thrash-ing machine with John C. Thompson. now deceased, owning one-half of the machine. In the winter of 1866-7 he taught school in Ogden.

BIS OGDEN CAREER.

March 24th, 1867, he commenced clerking for Bishop C. W. West in his store. In November, 1867, having sold land and collected debts in Virginia, he bought the merchandise of Bishop West and went into partnership with L. J. Her-rick. Their business was very prosper-ous. In March, 1869, he and Herrick ous. In March, 1869, he and Her sold their merchandise to the Z. C and Brigham Young selected Mr. Feery as manager of the Ogden branch. In July, 1869, he resigned as manager of the Z. C. M. I., but after a visit to Virginia he was again made manager of the same institution. December 6th, 1872, he bought the Weber grist mills and adjacent lands of William Jennings

and refitted the mills. On the 9th of February, 1881, a number of prominent citizens met at Mr. Peery's residence in Ogden to take the Initial step for the organization of the Ogden Herald company. Mr. Peery was elected chairman, and Joseph Hall secretary. A temporary organization was effected, consisting of D. H. Peery, president: Lester J. Herrick, vice president; Joseph Hall, secretary, and Charles F. Middleton, treasurer. At a general meeting of the prominent citi-zens of Weber county held in the city hall February 19th of the same year a permanent organization was completed with the same officers as above. New presses, type, etc., were purchased and on May 2nd, 1881, the first number of the Ogden Daily Evening Herald was issued. The paper was non partisan. The Herald was successful. In 1883 Mr. The Herald was successful. In 1855 Mr. Peery resigned his position as president of the institution. In July, 1882, while he was in Vir-ginia, the Weber mill, storehouse, flour, merchandise, etc., burned with a loss of \$60,000 with no insurance, his agent having neglected to renew the insurance. He rebuilt the Weber mills now called the Phoenix mills in partnership with James Mack, of Ogden.
