Saturday, Oct. 27, at 8 a. m., a priesthood meeting was held, and a spirit of brotherly love was enjoyed. The morning session of the conference convened at 10 a. m. Elders Jas. G. Duffin and Charles H. Hart gave some spirited and timely counsel to the saints on the building up of the colony. In the afternoon Elders Hyrum T. Clark, Gilbert W. Richardson, Walter J. WISCONSIN CONFERENCE.

Milwaukee, Wis., Nov. 16.—The semi-annual conference of the Wisconsin division of the Northern States mission convened in the Ziemann hall, 335 First avenue, Milwaukee, Nov. 10 and 11.

In all there were five meetings held, three public and two for the priesthood.

There were present Elder Hyrum M. Smith of the quorum of apostles, Elder Charles H. Hart of the council of elders, President G. E. Ellsworth of the Northern States mission, President John Russon of the Wisconsin conference, 22 traveling elders from Utah, Idaho, and Nevada, the saints of the Milwaukee branch and a goodly number of friends and strangers.

It was impossible for the visitors from Zion to be with us at our Saturday evening meeting. We were disappointed, of course, but nevertheless went right on with the conference.

The conference was opened with a short address of welcome by President John Russon.

The gospel principles and their restoration were presented in plainness by elders H. E. Smith, Robert A. Stetler, J. H. Elms, and W. Z. Zerk.

Sunday morning our visitors arrived in Milwaukee on the steamboat "Goodrich," and spent the forenoon visiting the Milwaukee branch Sunday school. Part of the time was occupied by these and each spoke words of encouragement and gave pointers for the betterment of the school.

Services Sunday afternoon began at 2 o'clock.

Robert A. Stetler addressed the congregation in the German language, speaking on the divine mission of the Prophet Joseph Smith.

Elder Charles H. Hart was the next speaker, "Charity" was his theme, which he treated in a very interesting manner. He explained how that the work done by elders is purely a labor of love for the welfare of the children of men, and exhorted the people to investigate the claims made by the Latter-day saints.

President George E. Ellsworth of the Northern States mission addressed the congregation next. In a convincing manner he explained the first principles and ordinances of the gospel, emphasizing the ordinances of baptism by immersion and the reception of the Holy Ghost by the laying on of hands.

The congregation listened to his remarks with close attention and interest while he beautifully portrayed the nature of our missionary labors. In part he said that our call to labor in the ministry came without our seeking. The elders of Israel, he said, were deeply interested in the preaching of the gospel; that their aim and object is to make the world better by the gospel, not to get earthly gain. Bore strong testimony to the divine mission of the Prophet Joseph and urged the people to investigate the gospel.

At the close of the services Elders Smith and Hart were interviewed by representatives of the "Press" and Milwaukee Sentinel papers.

At the evening session Elder Edw. Janoschek was the first speaker. His remarks were in German and upon the restoration of the gospel.

Elder Hyrum M. Smith spoke briefly in the Sunday evening service on the difficulties of Mormon missionary work. In his closing remarks Elder Smith made comparison of the belief of the Latter-day saints and how they preach the gospel, to the general belief of the so-called Christian churches and their manner of preaching. The former being in harmony with the teachings of Christ, while the latter is the form promulgated by man.

Elder Chas. H. Hart in a plain and reasonable way addressed the meeting on the subject of authority.

President G. T. Ellsworth made a few spirited remarks on the early rise of the Church, referring with much pride to those who accepted the gospel in the early rise of the Church and

who remained true and faithful in face of the opposition that confronted them.

On Monday a priesthood meeting of five hours duration was held. President G. E. Ellsworth presented the instructions and suggestions given by the visiting brethren and our president.

Following is the statistical report of the conference for the past seven months: Average number of elders, 20; Books of Mormon sold, 775; families visited, 32; families revisited, 7,312; gospel conventions, 43,435; hours spent in gospel conversation, 17,111; hours spent tracting, 11,331; tracts distributed, 6,513; books loaned, 429; books sold, 2,589; hall meetings held, 337; cottage meetings, 136; open air meetings, 403; baptisms, 14; children blessed, 4.

Richmond in Dodgeville and Edmund, Iowa Co.

A very profitable and pleasant feature of our conference was the music furnished by our visiting brethren, under the leadership of Elder F. M. Mortensen of Sanford, Colo.

In holding conferences throughout the state during this past summer, experience has taught us that to advertise musical selections is the best means to employ in getting the people out to hear the gospel. For this conference and one held in Waubesa, Oct. 27 and 28, we had musical programs and a cut of our male quartet printed and distributed which was the means of greatly increasing the number at our meetings.

We feel encouraged over conditions in this conference and wish to miss no opportunity of doing good when an opening presents itself.

Especially are we deeply interested in our branch of Zion. Its president, Elder C. Ruckert, has worked night and day for its growth and betterment. Our meetings, Sunday school, and improvement association, are well attended.

A church is now being constructed and will be ready for use about the middle of February, 1907. The local saints and some of the returned missionaries have donated freely toward the building of this house.
