

SOME COURT ECHOES.

The Darkies Held.—Dave Jordan goes free.—Release from the 'Pen.'

Having had a preliminary examination before Commissioner Greenman yesterday afternoon on a charge of a robbery (the complaint preferred by the husband of the woman), Artie Jones and Frank Richards (defended) were held to await the grand jury's action in a bond of \$500 and \$500 respectively. Failing to obtain the required sum they have gone to the "Pen," until again wanted. A witness for the prosecution, John W. H. Knox was also held over in spite of the grand jury's inaction or \$500, under a charge of perjury.

Dave Jordan, an employee of the Union Pacific Railway Co. at Coalville, who assaulted Hines Walker, another railroad man at Coalville, has been held to await the judgment of court. The facts were reported in yesterday's News. The complainant withdrew from the case.

John H. Barker, W. L. Crump and John Kline have been held to trial on charges of assault and battery which went up from the third district court on June 16, 1891, for two years for forgery, and Crump on March 15, 1892, for one year or assault.

Fred Wanless, administrator, has filed an action against J. W. Watson and Justice Hall's court to collect a merchandise bill of \$225.

Smith & Shippe have filed a suit against James Dwyer in Commissioner Ferguson's court and demand a judgment for \$10,000 for services alleged to have been performed.

The case of Charles Miller vs. the Island Crystal Salt company, in which Commissioner Moyer rendered judgment in favor of the plaintiff recently for \$15,75, will be appealed to the Third District court by the defendant.

He Does Not Favor It.

Governor A. L. Thomas is to receipt of a letter from Governor Markham of California, stating that at the last session the question was submitted to the voters of California whether or not they favored an amendment to the constitution providing for the election of United States senators by popular choice. The result was that all 900,000 voters favored an amendment and 15,000 voted against it. The Governor of Utah says he is not favorable to the election of United States senators by popular vote.
