Church and State.—This is a singular world. Circumstances alter cases. The right and wrong of a thing appears to be determined largely by the consideration as to who is the real or supposed perpetrator. "There should be no connection between church and state. The church should be distinctly separate. The church should not exercise an influence over the state." Such is the declared situation in reference to the latter day saints, who are accused of using a church influence as a lever upon matters of a political color.

How does this agree with the fanatical clamor of sectarian religionists of this country to put down "Mormonism" by special legal measures if possible, by brute force if necessary. To say that the priestly howl is not having an unjust and prejudicial effect in the public mind against this community would be foolish as well as incorrect. The meetings lately held throughout the nation have been instigated, and largely conducted by the hireling clergy, and from them the popular cry is taken up and sounded through the land.

The object is plain. It is to exercise a species of coercion toward the legislators of the country to compel them to make laws to accomplish their purpose. But then it is not the leading spirits of the Church of Latter-day Saints who are seeking to control the Legislative and political machinery of the country for special objects, consequently it is all right.

Should the Congress of the United States listen to the present popular outcry from the pulpits of sectarian priests, there will be presented the monstrous spectacle of a priest-ridden Republic, and a contradictory amalgamation of Church and State.

Interesting Lecture.—Last night in the 20th Ward school house, under the auspices of the Seventies, brother George M. Ottlinger delivered a highly interesting and instructive lecture upon evidences supporting the authenticity of the "Book of Mormon." He compared the traditions of numerous barbarous and semi-civilized tribes regarding the creation of the world and the deluge with the Mosaic records; also with the emigration of Lehi and his family from Palestine to America, as detailed in the Book of Mormon.
