LABOR WILLING
TO JOIN HANDS.

Will Assist Manufacturers' Association in Building up a Greater Utah.

MEETING THIS EVENING.

Directors and Members Will Meet Then And Indulge in a Heart-to-Heart Talk.

The meeting of the Manufacturers' and Merchants' association for this evening at the headquarters on West Temple street, is designed to be in the nature of a heart-to-heart talk between directors and members.

The officers will report on the progress of the work so far, and the plans yet to be carried out, which they are at work upon. In addition to this the question of fake advertising will be settled, and the resolution providing for the endorsement of all schemes by the executive committee will be introduced. Free discussion is expected and everybody who has an idea is expected to make it known, so that a complete understanding will be arrived at, and nothing will be done that has not general support among the membership.

LABOR REPRESENTED.

At the last meeting of the executive committee, a number of organized labor representatives were present, among them being A. J. Charlton, and D. J. Hanson of the Allied Printing Trades union, and J. E. Lavery, William Spalding, and A. Thompson of the Utah Federation of Labor. These men have stated that much of the printing done for local manufacturers is now procured outside of the state, and urge that if the manufacturers would do their part to practice home industry labor would do its part, and both factions would combine to keep money at home, and to build up the west.

MEETING FOR DISCUSSION.

After considerable discussion it was decided to call a meeting at which both sides of the question could be fully threshed out, and the trades councils could join with other citizens in working for a bigger Utah and a greater Salt Lake. At this meeting representatives of the Builders & Grocers, Manufacturers & Merchants, and the unions, will all come together to discuss the matter of Utah's upbuilding, and this is probably the only instance in America where all three of these classes of organized effort have found a common ground on which to pull together.

RESENTED INSINUATION.

J. U. Eldredge, Sr. Strikes Milando Pratt Because of Remark Made.

There was a slight mix-up between J. U. Eldredge, Sr., father of the county clerk, and Milando Pratt yesterday afternoon in the corridor just outside of Judge Morse's court room at the city and county building, but after one blow was struck friends of the parties separated them, and prevented further trouble. Mr. Eldredge was a witness in favor of plaintiff in the case of Mary M. Rowbotham against Milando Pratt and at the conclusion of the trial the jury returned a verdict for the plaintiff. Mr. Eldredge had testified falsely, whereupon Mr. Eldredge struck Mr. Pratt on the jaw. The suit was brought to quiet title to a piece of property at 237 West Second North street and Judge Morse decided the case in favor of plaintiff.

Report Shows a Balance Jan. 31 of \$414,441.00.

The report of state Treasurer Christensen for the month of January has been filed with the state auditor. It contains the following recapitulation: Balance December 31 \$649,724.30 Receipts for January 250,724.49 Total \$900,448.79 Disbursements for January \$486,007.49 Balance January 31 \$414,441.30 The disbursements were divided among the several funds as follows: General, \$144,411.82; state school, \$222,305.21; sheep inspection, \$2,609.01; redemption, \$18,492.83; agricultural college, \$240; institution for blind, \$1,839; reservoir, \$26,000; state school, \$300.

TO EXPOSE FAKE
CHARITY SCHEMES

Captain Woods of the Associated Charities Proposes to Lay Bare the Facts.

Speaks at Meeting Tonight.

Says Something Should be Done and Thinks Manufacturers' Association Should Do It.

It is an old perverted proverb that the mantle of charity covers a multitude of sins, and it is a declaration of Capt. M. M. Woods of the Salt Lake Charity association, that Salt Lake has gained mightily in the past from "skin" games worked upon its public in the name of charity.

"Donations for this cause and that," he declared this morning, "have been made in this city, and often the public has contributed without a full investigation, which indeed it would be impossible to make. I am glad the question is coming up, and if the manufacturers and merchants take it up, it will be placing the responsibility where it belongs, as they are the people who put up the money, and therefore have a right to know how it is expended. When our Charity association was formed it was intended that it should be an organization that it ever was, and have organized an association for the control of charity organizations, and to investigate into their merits, to see if they were really for the benefit of the community, and if the manufacturers take any steps to tell what charities shall be recommended and what shall not, they should also take steps to make complete investigation."

WILL SPEAK TONIGHT.

Capt. Woods will be present at the meeting of the Manufacturers and Merchants' association, and will lay bare the policy in regard to the handling of charities. He stated to the "News" this morning that he would also tell of some of the fakes that have been worked here in the past few years.

A RECENT OCCURRENCE.

Some of these are already known. Recently a donation was asked for the "Orphan's Home," and canvassers took money from most of the business houses, and over the city generally. Later it was found that the canvasser represented not a Salt Lake Orphan's home, but a Seattle institution, and the money collected was all shipped away.

STREET PREACHER'S GRAFT.

Another graft worked recently was by a street preacher who imitated the Salvation Army except that he didn't actually have the beds for working men, and baths, and maintained only a very small establishment where he charged sufficient to make a revenue independent of what he received from his appeals on the street.

Capt. Woods has been in charity work here for a number of years, and it is probable that his catalogue of fakes, if he decides to announce it, will be quite extensive.
