Appropriation Bill May Bring Another Clash Between the House and Senate.

TOTAL EXCEEDS REVENUE.

But Measures Have Been Passed by Which it is Though the Taxes Will be Raised.

At 6 o'clock last night the senate finished work upon the big appropriation bill. Today will probably see the result in a relaxation of interest on the part of the laborers in the upper legislative valley and tonight there will probably be a general deflection towards the depots, whether the session

towards the depots, whether the session formally disbands or not. The senatorial action on appropria-tions was accomplished without great difficulty. No appropriations were add-ed to, and none were taken away from in any serious manner, excet in the case of the Cedar Branch Normal, which had \$10,060 added to it, instead of re-ceiving a trimming at legislative bands. The appropriation bill calls for an expenditure of \$1,890,725.35. This is an increase over the original draft of \$6,000, and an increase of \$123,196.36 over the estimated revenues for the next two years. However it is the rule that about \$75,000 in funds allow-ing the expenditure of "so much as may ing the expenditure of "so much as may be necessary," fails to get spent dur-ing the biennial period, and reverts to ing the oral treasury. Moreover there have been some laws passed calculated to raise the revenue, so it is not thought that the appropriation will seriously run behind the income.

THE SCHOOLS AGAIN.

The fighting is not yet over on ap-propriations as there is the house yet to be considered, and the educational items on that committee's report are different from the senatorial items. That will line the friends of these two That will line the friends of these two institutions up again in a battle simi-lar to all other pitched battles between them since statchood. As every bill calculated to solve the present fight between the schools met death, the legis-lature passes the problem on in identi-cally its ancient form, to become an issue of the next campaign as it was of the last. The last hours of the scs-sion will probably be spent in a final struggle for money between the schools just as were the final hours of the last session. The failure of the legislature to get together on the educational problem is its most conspicuous achievement to date, and it came about because the senate deadlocked with the house. Plans have al-ready been drawn by Messrs. Headlund and Wood and have been accepted by the Murray Band association which is ostensibly at the back or the project. One of the features of the structure will be the dancing floor which will be built of White Rock maple, seven inches thick and one inch wide. With each board set on edge in this manner a wonderful floor is assured. Added to this it is the intention to set the floor on spiral steel springs resting on con-crete piers.
