OLD BUNCO GAME ONCE MORE

Sample of Some of the Communications Which Are Being Malled to Residents in Salt Lake.

The old and mouldy green goods game is being worked again in this part of the country, or at least an attempt is being made to push it. Within the last few days letters have been received by different persons here in which the bogus greenback is offered for sale "dirt cheap," and absolute safety guaranteed.

If the recipient of the letter is simple minded enough he answers the communication and receives a genuine \$1 bill. Thinking the game is a good one he agrees to purchase a large amount of the bogus stuff. He goes to meet the "dealer" and is given a grip, or package suposed to contain the bills. Upon more careful investigation the victim finds he has purchased a lot of worthless paper, or perchance, a box of sawdust. It is an old trick and it seems

prusing that it is still being worked throughout the country with any degree of success.

HOW IT IS WORKED.
